## Town Council.

At last Friday night's meeting of the Council the full board was present.

Alderman Burt, from the Committee appointed to look into the mystery of the existence of Gold Street, reported that Surveyor Stone had made measurements according to an old plan, showing the existence of a street in that locality, bearing the name of Spruce Street. The Surveyor had fortified this by giving his personal recollection that such a street did exist. The Clerk explained that the street no doubt exists, and there is no need of anticipating trouble until some person actually resists the opening. He further stated that the town should be wary about getting into lawsuits, as there are two cases already in which heavy costs must be paid, and he felt that the town would not feel like taking on any more such trouble.

Ald Burt, from the Committee appointed to investigate the bill of W. Fisher for curbing, reported that he for one must confess that his head was too thick to see through all the circumstances, and he felt that the only way to straighten out the tangle would be to get all concerned together. He therefore asked for further time, which was granted.

On motion of Ald Dunbar, seconded by Ald Burt, the tender of O. I. Churchill for laying water pipe on Houlton road, was accepted.

Ald Fisher reported that he had received several tenders for hose, but the firemen preferred the Paragon. He therefore moved that 250 feet be purchased at \$1.00 per foot through W. F. Diblee & Son. Carried. On motion 24 ft of suction hose was ordered purchased from Canadian Rubber Co.

Ald Hagerman brought up the matter of sewer extension on Elm St. He had instructed the Supt to get an estimate some time ago, and at the last meeting the official reported the distance to be 400 feet, and intimated that anything further in the line of information would have to be obtained elsewhere.

Ald Hagerman said the former Supts had always got such information, and he thought the present one should get it now. The Mayor suggested that the committee get estimates from contractors. The Alderman moved for authority to go ahead with installing the sewer. Ald Noble seconded it. Ald Dunbar in amendment moved that the Committee first get estimates. Ald Hagerman suggested that perhaps the veteran misunderstood his motion. He would do nothing without first consulting the full board. The motion carried. Ald Burt said the street committee requires about 150 feet of curbing and some asphalt. The Mayor said he gladly observed there was no tar needed, as last year a double dose was purchased. Authority was given to secure the goods.

The tender of John Graham for groceries was accepted.

Lieut Colonel D. McLeod Vince submitted a bill for \$250.45 for services in connection with the appeal to the Supreme Court at Ottawa in the case of The Carleton Woollen Co. vs The Town of Woodstock. "See what it costs to win" sagely observed the Mayor.

A petition from a number of ratepayers was received, praying for permission to erect poles and string wires, upon their incorporation as an Independent Telephone Co, which it is proposed to at once establish. Ald Noble said he did not relish paying for two telephones, yet in his twelve years of life in Woodstock the only time he ever got a satisfactory service was when he paid for two. He moved that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. This was seconded by Ald Sutton, and granted without further discussion.

Acting Chairman Belyea and Trustee Balmain, as delegation from the School Board, asked for a walk to be laid at the College. Ald Hagerman agreed with the prayer of the petitioners, but thought the Broadway School needed a walk equally as much as the College. The Mayor said the School Board had never taken him into their confidence as to why they had asked these last two years for such a big amount, and he considered they could well afford to do the work themselves. Ald Burt said workmen were scarce, but if they could be secured something might be done to assist the Trustees. In this connection he said he would like to see the Woodstock license on laborers abolished. Re the Milmore case, the Mayor said he thought the Town better cease hostilities. The Clerk explained the circumstances in connection therewith, and after some further discussion, on motion of Ald Noble, an order on the Treasurer in the sum of \$513.00 was ordered paid to Mrs. Milmore's attorney in settlement of the suit as verdict and costs.

On motion of Ald Sutton, seconded by Ald Noble and Hagerman, Edgar W. Mair was elected a School Trustee to succeed W. B. Belyea, whose term of office will expire on June 30th.

Acting Chairman Belyea here took occasion to refute the Mayor's contention in the matter of alleged failure to give the Council a proper idea of what money they spent. Mr. Belyea said each year the account is filed as by law required, and that the Trustees had done their duty to the letter.

On motion of Ald Noble, the limit for obtaining the five per cent tax discount was placed at July 25th. The assessment is to be ready about the 20th inst. Bills and accounts were then considered.

## Base Ball.

Friday night the Broadway Boys did themselves credit by trimming the fast Bankers nine in a five inning struggle. David Slipp was in the box for the winners, and chewed the Bankers all to pieces. David has a fast straight ball which the financial gentlemen couldn't find. Moreover, he has a great wing in throwing to bases, and woe be to any who tries to steal. David bids fair to become the local lemon king. Clarence Sprague pitched four innings for the Bankers, but didn't seem quite able to keep the hits scattered. In the fifth Ernie Ryan shot them over so nicely that the winners couldn't score. The statistics stood 7 to 4 in favor of the South siders. Dalling and Scholey starred for the losers—Slipp, Jones and McRae for Broadway.

## Richmond Corner.

A very delightful concert was given by the Presbyterian Mission Band at McKenzie Corner on the evening of Wednesday 5th inst. The numerous exercises and choruses were well rendered and reflect much credit on the children and the promoters of the concert, and the receipts of the evening are unknown to your correspondent as yet.

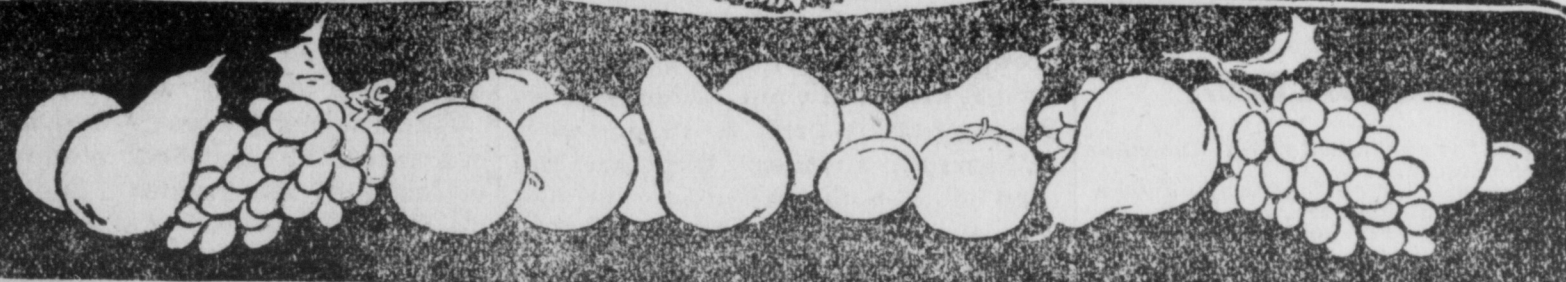
