Gravel Roads.

In the construction of gravel roads the main points to observe are:

(1) That the roadbed is first pro perly graded and crowned.

(2) That the drains at the side of the road have a steady fall to a good outlet, and that every drain has an

(3) That the gravel is clean, and

(4) That the gravel when dropped on the road is kept in a straight line and is evenly spread.

(5) That, when spreading the gravel, large stones are raked forward so as to be under the next load.

(6) That old gravel roads with a solid foundation have the shoulder cut off and thrown outward-not drawn to the centre. To cut away the shoulders will frequently do the road more good than to put on a covering of new gravel.

(7) That the cost of hauling the gravel is kept at a minimum by fix. ing the size of the roads, and the number of loads to constitute a day's

The larger The best pit gravel for roadwork is clean, free from an excess of sand have a very fine line of Upholstered Go-Carts and Carriages and clay, composed of stones of varying size up to one and one-half inches in diameter, with just enough fine stuff to fill the voids and make a compact mass. The appearance in the face of a pit, is that of an almost solid mass of pebbles, from the size of marbles up to 12 inches in diameter. Where such gravel stands upright in the pit, after the spring thaw, with no trace of slipping, it may be considered fit for use on the road without any treatment.
