

Premier McBride's government was sustained in the British Columbia elections on Saturday. The fight was a terrific one, and rather complicated through the presence of so many socialist and independent candidates. The three cities,—Victoria, Vancouver and Westminster,—elected ten conservatives, which is just the majority the government will have. Hon J Fred Hume and Mr W DeB Farris, former New Brunswickers opposing the government, were among the slain. James F Garden, a former Woodstock boy, held his seat in Vancouver with a big majority. The campaign was mainly on local issues. McBride is certainly a great political warrior, and may enter the federal arena. Dr James H King, son of Senator King, and who recently was married at Andover, retained his former seat at Cranbrook with a big majority.


