Presentation to Terry.

T V Monohan, the new proprietor of the Barker House, Fredericton, was here Wednesday completing the transfer of the Royal Cafe to Frederick McLean. Taking advantage of Mr Monohan's presence, his many warm admirers planned a surprise in the form of a presentation. The genial Terry was invited in the evening to take a stroll up to the Town Hall. Once inside, his gaze met the faces of half a hundred leading citizens, with Mr J C Hartley as chairman and spokesman. After exchanging formal greetings, Mr Hartley rose and made some happy remarks, winding up with the reading of an eulogistic address, and the presentation of a beautiful and massive mission style solid leather upholstered chair. Terry was deeply affected but managed to express his warm appreciation of the fact that in Woodstock he is leaving many warm friends, to whom he would always extend a cordial greeting, and the best of the house affords.

Speeches were made by Major Good, J Rankin Brown, John McKenzie, J J Troy and others, all joining in the general sense of loss by the departure of so worthy a citizen. It must not be forgotten that accompanying the gift to Mr Monohan there was a very ornamental handkerchief and glove case for Mrs Monohan. Terry left here yesterday afternoon on the Gibson train for his new home.

A meeting of the Board of Health was held on Monday evening, the chairman, Dr Griffin, presiding. The inspector was instructed to see that all places wherein scarlet fever has existed be thoroughly fumigated before the inmates are allowed to go out, and to keep a sharp look-out for any new cases which may arise. It is hoped that the disease is dying out.

There have only been about a half a dozen cases in all. A number of other matters were also discussed dealing with the prevention of disease in the town when spring sets in, and a meeting of the Board will be held later in the winter to more fully deal with the same. The Board wishes to impress on the Town Council that in every case where a sewer is accessible to a house occupant he be immediately compelled to enter the sewer, and also that where sewers are required in the central portions of the town they be laid. The opinion of the Board was that cess pools and old dry closets should be dispensed with within the settled parts of the town, as they are undoubtedly breeders of disease.

BOARD OF HEALTH REGULATIONS.

The following Regulations of the Board of Health are published by the order of Local Board of Health No. 3.

Any household in whose house there shall occur a case of small pox, cholera, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever or measles, shall immediately notify the Board of Health of that district of the same.

When a physician knows or suspects that any person to whom he has been called is sick or has died of any of the diseases named in rule 4 (the foregoing rule) he shall immediately notify the Local Board of Health of that district.

Whenever a case of scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus fever or small pox exists in any house or dwelling a notice or placard shall be posted on or near the door of such house stating that such disease exists therein, and no person shall remove such notice or placard without the authority of the Local Board of Health of that district.

A rigid quarantine shall be put upon any person sick of the diseases mentioned in rule 4 for a period of at least three weeks or until the Local Board of Health shall permit the quarantine to be removed. During this period all persons not necessarily in attendance there shall be excluded from the patient's room.

Any person afflicted with a contagious disease shall not be allowed to leave any health district before the Local Board of Health of that district has notified the Local Board of Health of that district to which such person is to be removed.—B.

The Care of the Hands.

BY A LEADING DERMATOLOGIST.

Article No. 1.—"On the Care of the Nails."

IT is important after drying the hands to press the cuticle softly back from the nails with an orange wood stick. This gives the desired length and prevents hang-nails. The pressing down of the cuticle is essential for well-shaped nails. If the operation produces any raggedness, a keen pair of scissors should clip it off. The points should be very fine to insert under this hem of the nail. To give the nails the desired tint and brilliant polish a cosmetic should first be applied and rubbed in thoroughly, followed by the proper nail polish, after which the nails should be rubbed with a chamois buffer. This operation takes but a few minutes and the result more than repays one for the time spent. (We carry in stock a full line of the necessary articles for the proper care of the nails.)
