The New Council.

There was a large audience in the Council Chamber Monday night to witness the opening session of the 1907 town council. His Worship the Mayor and his colleagues had their best foot forward in anticipation. Everything passed off most harmoniously, and if their first meeting is any criterion of what is to follow, our present town fathers will not be one whit lacking in all that constitutes fitness for the high and honorable position thrust upon them by their admiring fellow citizens. Clerk Hartley after administering the oath of office to the Council, rose and announced the result of the recent election. The Mayor then gave his inaugural, which we publish in full, and the Council settled down to business. The chairmen of the various committees were appointed as follows:—

Finance, Coun Noble;
Fire, Coun Fisher;
Water and Light, Coun Dunbar;
Streets, Coun Burt;
Poor, Coun Sutton;
Sewers, Coun Hagerman.

A Scott Act committee was also named, consisting of Couns Noble, Burt and Sutton. The Mayor read certain communications from the Methodist, Reformed Baptist and Adventist Churches, praying for the refusal of licenses to pool rooms and bowling alleys. On motion the letters were tabled.

The matter of selecting the officials passed off as smoothly as if everything had been cut and dried in advance. J. C. Hartley on motion of Couns Noble and Fisher was re-appointed Clerk and Solicitor; H. W. Bourne, Treasurer on motion of Couns Noble and Burt; Owen Kelly, Chief of Police on motion of Couns Hagerman and Sutton; Thomas McCarron night watch on motion of Couns Sutton and Burt; Owen Kelly as Truant Officer on motion of Couns Dunbar and Sutton, and as Poor Commissioner on nomination of Couns Sutton and Burt.

On motion of Couns Dunbar and Sutton, Hubert Seely was made chief assessor. Coun Hagerman, seconded by Coun Fisher, proposed John Thibbadeau and Capt. Thomas Duncan as associates. Carried.

Coun Burt nominated John H. Bagley for driver of Town team. Seconded by Coun Sutton the motion passed unanimously.

Coun Dunbar moved that Joseph Fewer, Commissioner of Water Works and Sewers, be given one month's notice that his services are no longer desired. Coun Burt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. The council, after passing this motion to Mr. Fewer, decided to leave the matter of nominating a successor to the Water Committee, for a report to-night (Friday) Coun Dunbar, seconded by Coun Hagerman, secured the passage of a resolution calling for tenders for the digging and laying of the new suction pipe and turbine at the Water Works. Several reports were received, and on motion referred to the usual committees.

Coun Dunbar wished to have the Town Treasurer's office in the Town Hall. He strongly favored the move. The Mayor said last year this was suggested to the Treasurer, who demurred. Coun Dunbar retorted that the Council legislated for the convenience of the ratepayers, rather than that of individuals. The council as a whole is to deal with the matter.

Rev B. Colpitts, Scott Act Inspector threw a bombshell into the council in the shape of his resignation. On motion of Coun Noble, seconded by Coun Fisher, it was accepted. The Inspector's report for the year was received and referred to the Scott Act Committee. The receipts for the year were \$990, with a balance of \$86.75 in the Inspector's hands. Bills of \$155 from A. B. Connell K. C. and \$95 from Wm Dibble J. P. were presented however, and the apparent deficit is therefore close to \$150.

The School Trustees sent a requisition asking for \$8000 to run the schools during the year, being about the same as last year. This was ordered received and put through the usual channel. Wm M. Connell, clerk of the County Court, sent a presentment from the December Grand Jury re Junk Dealers. This went to the License Com. In this connection the Mayor said it would be well for the Council to look into the matter of restricting the beer saloons. If a license of \$500 or \$600 were imposed, some of them would be apt to close their doors.

On motion of Coun Sutton seconded by Coun Noble, the Night Watch and the Chief of Police were ordered to keep a vigilant watch on the street lights and report the location and duration of any failure on the part of any of the said lamps to keep burning as provided in the contract with the Gas Company.

Resolutions were passed authorizing all freight, expressage and customs charges to be paid by the Treasurer on order of any councillor; also that all town printing be put up to tender, and that no bills for any

town supplies whatever be paid except such as have been ordered by vote. After the reading of a large number of bills, the council adjourned until this (Friday) evening.

The resignation of Inspector Colpitts came as a big surprise. Coun Noble and his colleagues, in the event of not being able to find a man who gives promise of being more efficient than the former Inspector will doubtless urge the old official to resume the position. To a majority of the citizens this course would doubtless be acceptable.

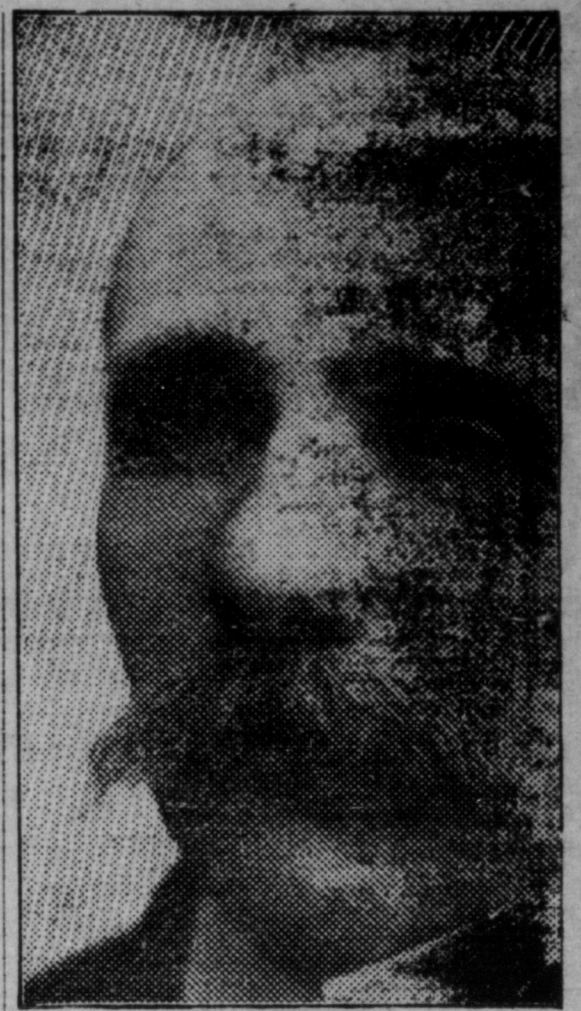
We have eight schools, eight Churches and eight Doctors. So you see our educational spiritual and physical welfare is well provided for.
