Notes from the University of New Brunswick.

Our Provincial University is well launched upon another year, which promises to be the most successful in its history. Fifty-six new students have entered, forty-one into the freshman class, making a total enrollment of over 150, the largest of any year up to date.

Dr C C Jones closed his first year as Chancellor with success and starts his second with splendid prospects. Dr L W Bailey after over forty years able service has left us but we welcome Phillip Cox Ph D to fill his position. Dr Brittain was with us only a few years but earned a high place. Professor Carson takes his chair and is measuring up well to the high standards required. Professor Cartmel in the chair of Physics promises to be a worthy successor of Dr Scott. Prof MacDonald in the chair of Philosophy and Economics, Geoghegan in English and French, Raymond in Classics and Perrott in Civil Engineering are filling their accustomed spheres of usefulness. Prof Perrott at the head of the Engineering School is now assisted by a new professor recently added to the staff, John Stevens of Dublin.

Our football team has returned from their trip and have tied in the Intercollegiate Series for the King Richardson Trophy. On Oct 31st we defeated Mt Allison for the second time in our history. Our team won from St Joseph College, Algonquins of St John, Mt Allison and King's College, tied the Marathons and lost to Acadia College, the only defeat—a splendid season.

Our Y M C A is well under way and sent eight delegates to the Maritime Convention in New Glasgow. The Y W C A is also doing good work.

There are at least seventeen Carleton County Students in attendance, eleven of them from Woodstock, early next week.

Dry hardwood in stovelengths is being furnished in fairly liberal quantities at about \$5.50 per cord. Potatoes still bring a dollar. Good butter is snapped up at 25 cents, while strictly fresh eggs are worth anything the owner asks. Beef is here in plenty, and brings about 6 cts by the carcass. Pork is in poor demand. Chickens have dropped to 10 cts. Oats are scarce. Hay is coming in gradually, and will not be so high as predicted. The outside crop was big.
