The Nova Scotia government has decided to follow the lead of New Brunswick, and this week Premier Murray introduced a measure abolishing statute labor, and in its stead providing for a direct tax of 30 cents per \$100 of valuation.

Last week we announced that F B Carvell M P had arranged for the revoting of the former subsidies from the Dominion government in aid of the St John Valley Railway. On Monday Hon Mr Fielding brought down the items, exactly as we had stated.

One of the interesting local industries is that of Robert S Corbett, in the McCormac Building, Connell St. Mr Corbett manufactures fanning mills, which are meeting a ready demand. He does general repair work. A visit to the premises will repay anyone.

In the St John civic elections held Tuesday, Ald Pickett, well known in this section, was re-elected by a big majority. Ald Lockhart, equally well known, fell by a narrow margin.

James N Sloat, of Tracy's Mills, a respected and upright gentleman, died at his home on Sunday, after a long illness. It will be remembered that last summer while working on a building he fell to the ground, the injury causing paralysis. He bore his long sickness with patient resignation. He was a consistent member of the Baptist Church, and a prominent Liberal. His friends were legion, and his death will leave a gap that will be hard to fill.

From the ashes of her dead self she will rise still greater.

Rev Dr Sprague, St John, condemns Sunday sacred concerts as desecrations of the day. But what is the choir singing at a church service but a concert, more or less sacred, especially when the music is good enough to be dignified by the name? The preachers would do more good by trying to reform the evil than by attempting to restrict the innocent recreations of the well disposed and well behaved. Successful preachers are those who quicken the spiritual life of their hearers, not those who rail at their harmless recreations. If the hearts of the people are right their conduct will not be bad. The theological school should establish a Common Sense chair. Then their graduates might not be immature enough to think it possible to help people to purity of heart and a home in heaven by stopping them from dancing, whist playing or Sunday trips into the country for air, exercise and recreation. 
