The British armored cruiser Invincible was launched Saturday afternoon from the Elswick shipyard. She is one of the trio of largest cruisers in the world, of which the first, the Indomitable, was launched March 16. Under the Admiralty orders, the greatest secrecy was observed in order to prevent any details of the salient features of the new warship being disclosed. Her dimensions are the same as those of the Indomitable, namely, she is of 17,250 tons, is 530 feet long, exceeding the older armored cruisers by fifty feet; has turbine engines, and is expected to attain the high speed of twenty-five knots an hour. The armament of these three cruisers includes eight 12-inch guns, almost equalling the main battery of the Dreadnought.
