The Saskatchewan Valley Company.

In their foolishly mendacious way the Conservative newspapers summarize what they call the Saskatchewan Valley Land "deal" by saying that "the Government sold \$10 land for \$1 an acre." As this is one of the instances of "graft" which it charges against the Government, it is worth while analyzing the above statement. The land which the Government sold to the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company had remained neglected ever since the Northwest was opened for settlement. Both the present Government and its predecessors under Bowell, Thompson, Abbott or Macdonald would have been glad to give it away to any settler for nothing. But no one could be induced to look at it. It was unquestionably an unpromising piece of territory. It lay like a desert between two prosperous sections of country. The Government's land lookers had reported unfavorably upon it, not once but frequently. Then the Saskatchewan Land Valley Co., which had bought out the sections also, covenanted to adopt energetic measures for the settlement of the land. The Government accepted the offer, with the consequence that the land is now fairly well settled and has ceased to be an eyesore and the drag on the rest of the country that it formerly was. So that the transaction which the opposition organs cite as a sample piece of graft has put a large sum of money in the Dominion treasury for land which would gladly have been given away for nothing to settlers. In short, the object of the Government, namely, to get the land settled, has not only been accomplished, but a large sum of money has also been paid into the exchequer. But say the organs, the company made a large profit. Probably, they increased the value of their own lands adjacent to them by reclaiming the desert lands which they got from the Government and it may be that they made something out of these lands, and they deserved to make it. They put down artesian wells to begin with and thereby found abundance of water; they took in trainloads of people from the United States and fed and sheltered them while they tested the place; they have planted settlers all along in this hitherto God forsaken region and thereby have taken away the forbidding appearance of this section and instead of criticism the Government and the Company should be given thanks for that which they have done.—The Globe.

The Newfoundland Question.

In an article dealing with the Newfoundland trouble the Toronto Globe says:

The comments of the British journals of different complexions on the correspondence between the British and American governments on the Newfoundland fisheries question can hardly be pleasant reading for Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman and his colleagues. The dispute was started by Secretary Root, who wrote the British Minister at Washington explaining the views taken by the United States government of his nation's treaty rights, and urging Great Britain to secure a repeal of the Newfoundland laws conflicting therewith. After some time a reply was sent by Sir Edward Grey so the American Minister in London, regretting that he could not comply with Mr Root's request "without important qualification," which he seems to have specified. Mr Root's rejoinder was a dissent from some of the British views and a suggestion that, pending further negotiations with a view to a further settlement, some means be adopted to prevent interference with American fishermen in the exercise of their treaty rights. Sir Edward Grey expressed his readiness to arrange a modus vivendi "applicable only to the ensuing season," and this was agreed to by the two governments.

It is useless to ignore the gravity of the issue thus raised. The Newfoundland statute which has given offence to the American government has been regularly assented to and enforced. This enactment must prevail until it is repealed either by the Newfoundland legislature or the Imperial Parliament. No agreement between the British and American governments can either impair its validity or impede its operation. It is not likely that the Imperial Parliament will intervene at this stage and the best if not the only way out of the difficulty seems to be such a joint undertaking on the part of the two national governments to leave Newfoundland's position unprejudiced as would warrant legislation by the Newfoundland Parliament to legalize the modus vivendi for a year. If the province wants to retain the good opinion of all parties this would not be too high a price to pay for it.

"Canada," the new London Weekly, discussing the tariff in its last issue observes among other things: As it had been the chief object of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's political career to remove the causes of friction between the two races and religions of the Dominion—a task which may be said to have been completed by the government settlement of the separate schools question in the West—so it must now be the great aim of Canadian statesmen to reconcile the economic differences between the growing agricultural West and the industrial East which, though a large portion of its population is dependent on highly-developed forms of agriculture, is deeply interested in the progress of manufacturing industries.

Mr. Fielding announced that his government proposed "to adhere to that principle of British preference which was laid down in 1897," thereby finally removing the doubts of certain British manufacturers—doubts expressed in their hesitation to incur the first costs of obtaining a foothold in the Dominion market—as to the permanent nature of the Canadian preference. Canada has consistently opposed the notion, widely current in the mother country, that the preference was to be withdrawn wholly or in part by way of rebuke to the British people for refusing to give a quid pro quo at the general election—the first time of asking for tariff reform—and our opposition to the assertions of tariff reformers on this subject was based on the certainty that the Canadian consumer would never be induced to permit the abrogation of an arrangement which, according to Mr. Fielding, has saved him twenty-eight million dollars on the cost of goods imported from Great Britain during the last ten years. The growing political weight of the West is indeed a perpetual guarantee that the margin of discrimination in favor of the British manufacturer will not be diminished, may even be increased, during the life of the present Canadian government.
