OUT IT DOWN.

The SENTINEL feels like giving a word of warning now that a new council is to be chosen. It will never do to elect men who will not pledge themselves to exercise the strictest economy. We are now about at the limit of our tax-paying capacity. We make bold to affirm that a \$32,000 assessment is too much for a town of 4000 inhabitants. Eight dollars per capita is altogether out of reason. It is true that we have no very large leaks in the town finances, yet it is none the less a fact that by careful cheeseparing, if the Board can only be induced to take the stand, a substantial reduction may be brought about. Ten years ago a \$22,000 assessment ran the town. A thousand a year is too great a jump. In our humble opinion \$25,000 is amply sufficient at the present. Let each elector, when marking his ballot, vote only for those pledged to the strictest economy.

NICOLET.

There was a by-election for a seat in the Commons in the County of Nicolet, Que., last week, over which the conservative newspapers are not doing any crowing. At the last general election Hon Rodolphe Lemieux was returned for both Gaspe and Nicolet. Eventually choosing to sit for the former, his decision necessitated a new contest in the latter. The candidates were Chas Devlin ex-M P for Wright, also recently member for Galloway in the Imperial parliament, and George Ball, who sat as conservative member for the county during the last parliament. Devlin, a total stranger and an Irishman in a French constituency, found himself running against the strongest local man in the conservative party. It was expected even by Devlin's friends that he would have difficulty in winning the seat, but imagine the crestfallen countenances of the conservatives when the returns showed that the Irish orator had rolled up a majority of almost 500. It's no use talking, Quebec is Liberal to the core.

The Restigouche Election

As was generally expected, Wm Currie the government nominee, was elected in the by-election held Wednesday in Restigouche County to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the present Judge McLatchey. The Opposition made a dead set on the county, and as their candidate, ex-Sheriff Stewart, is a very strong man personally, succeeded in cutting down the usual liberal majority to about 125. Of course the normal liberal lead in Restigouche is about 400, but these figures were somewhat exceeded in the rather listless local fight of three years ago. Everything considered, the government will have cause for rejoicing at the result—while Mr Hazen, Mr Morrissey, and their wonderful organizer, Mr Hubbard, will retire to the tall pines. Restigouche is safe, in fact the whole North Shore is solid for the Tweedie administration.

Mr Hazen is an optimist. He told an interviewer the day after the Restigouche election that he has strong hopes of sweeping the North Shore in the general contest. We beg to remind the honorable leader of fact that the Northern Counties are not in his grasp, and never will be. He is more likely to lose than gain in that part of the province.

Political.

Discussing its favorites, the Citizen's Ticket, the Press says "Why not vote for them all." Arrant nonsense—Even the editor himself will not vote for them all.

We repeat the statement that Couns McManus and Fields were turned down by the clique because they are not clay in the hands of the potter who seeks to mould the Council at his will.

Local government prospects in Charlotte are said to be bright. Those who listened to Mr George Byron's display of forensic ability during the recent Liberal Convention must have been deeply impressed with the fact that in him the county has the making of a splendid future representative.

Of course the opposition papers are doing a little crowing over the reduction in the liberal majority in Restigouche, but the seat is still held by the government, and that after all is the important thing. In an election a miss is as bad as a mile.

The Press says we have experienced a change of heart respecting the manner of selecting a ticket for the Council, and cites the occasion two or three years back when we supported a ticket in opposition to the Council of the day. The cases are not on a par. The reform ticket of that year did not profess to be a "Citizens Ticket,"—neither did anyone make such a claim in its behalf. Unlike the hole and corner alleged "Citizens Ticket" of the present day, the ticket in question sailed under its true colors. The Press knows and cannot deny that the ticket it is supporting is no such thing as a real, genuine Citizens Ticket.
