THE OLD AND THE NEW.

This law of the interpretation of the new by the principles of the old is dominant in every phase of life. Take the ordinary perception of a chair: I say I see a chair. It is of definite size, and colour, has a square seat etc. Now, very little reflexion will convince me that past experience has gone into this perception. For the size of the chair varies with its distance from us, and it is only after repeated experiences, in which the other senses have made contributions, and experience under different conditions and situations, that I come to regard it of a certain size. Moreover from my present position the seat is not square but is a rhomboid, and were I to draw it I would draw a figure with obtuse and acute angles. The child spends several days and weeks of his life gaining material and learning control of his sense organs before he is able to have a perception at all. It is no small task to co-ordinate the muscles of the eye and ear and hand, so that all will work together, and to fuse into the sight experience the contents that come from the other senses. Perhaps we will understand this a little plainer if we analyze our perception of an orange. From the sense of touch alone we get a feeling of pressure evenly distributed—and from this we are able to infer the general shape, the sense of smell adds the additional quality of agreeable perfume, and taste further enriches the percept by the feeling of sweet ness, etc., which the eye discovers a little patch of orange colour. Now, after repeated experiences in which hand and nostril and tongue and eye have worked together we are able the very moment the eye detects a patch of orange colour to experience all the other sensations fused into the eye content so that it is no longer merely a patch of color we see but an orange, that is we have a perception in which definite qualities of taste, color, smell, and pressure are fused into one feeling.

There is therefore no object of vision which is not to a large extent an object of prevision, no percept which is not termed a precept. From the physiological standpoint we might say that every new perception is brought to our consciousness by the use of nerves, muscles, and brain-cells that from past experiences have acquired certain habits of action. Even here then it is the old that lives in the new, that interprets and gives meaning to the new.

Or for illustration of the same law let us turn to the realm of natural science. Let us take for example the case of a botanist who has discovered a new flower or fruit. How will he seek to understand it? He will bring to it the knowledge and categories of the past. What is its relation and how does it differ from other flowers or fruits with which he is familiar? He finds that certain general principles hold of the new as of the old, and by the application of the old the fruit is classified and articulated into a system of knowledge. But on the other hand, the new fruit is related to every member of the old class, and so the old gains new content and value by the discovery of the new. Your boy tells you that he is to begin the new study of trigonometry. That is the new. But it is only through his knowledge of arithmetic and algebra and geometry that he will be able to deal with signs and cosigns and tangents. That is the old. And as he progresses in the new study and applies the principles of his past studies will he come to understand the significance and value of those studies.

The same holds true of our moral life. Every new situation and every

clouds of a threatening sky. But the God of the past is still their refuge and guide, transforming pain and sorrow into an alembic for the sanctification of life. This is the old. Aye, but the strange path in the midst of foes, without the companionship of fellow-travellers of the past, reveals new needs, hitherto unfelt weakness, and the guide becomes more and more. That is the new. The God of the clear sky is the darkness; that is the old. But the pillar of cloud by day has been transformed into the pillar of fire by night: that is the new. The opportunity has arrived for the God of the past to reveal himself again and the new revelation but makes richer and more precious the old. It is the same God but he grants a new revelation of himself to meet the needs of a growing life. The increase of knowledge and the accumulating experiences of life will seem to contradict old faith and call for many a readjustment and cause many a doubt, but out of all will emerge a stronger and more intelligent faith, and yet the new is the fruit of which the old is the flower.

The new, then, calls us to sanctify ourselves. If ever there is a time when self-examination, and consecration are needed it is surely at the crisis of a life. Then before we cross the Jordan let us gather up the lessons of the past and lay to heart its great principles, follow the ark that has led us and the God who has protected us. Only so dare we enter, only so shall we have strength to abide in the land of promise. The rich man reduced to poverty needs this lesson. The poor man upon whom now for the first time prosperity smiles, must take to heart the injunction of Joshua else he will fall by the giants and gods of the new land that he is about to possess. With this preparation, pain and disappointment and sickness and death minister to spiritual culture and redemption. Above all the man who finds that his old beliefs are crumbling that his religious conceptions are decaying, needs to consecrate himself before he crosses the Jordan and enters the new intellectual promised land. Let him look back and learn the value of the past, behold the ark that has led him, the God who has been his refuge and protection. Let him empty himself of vanity and pride and sin. Let him examine himself and see to it that he seeks only a larger and holier and nobler life. Here is his preparation, here is his opportunity for a richer revelation. Then may he know.

"Our little systems have their day, They have their day and cease to be; They are but broken lights of thee, And thou, O Lord, art more than they."

But he shall know, too, the value old and may say with Browning, "All that is at all, Last ever, past recall;

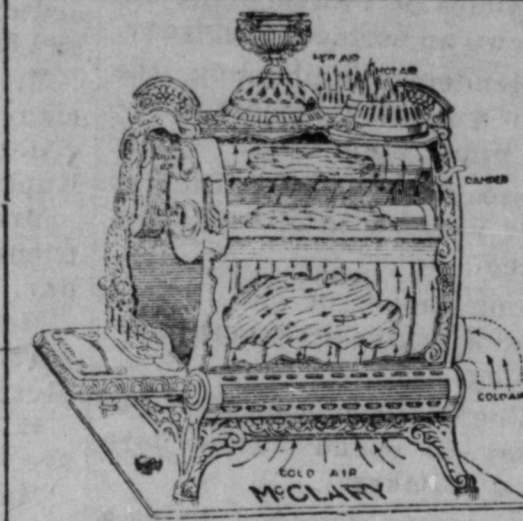

temptation is met by the application of the principles of life that we have abstracted from the past and somewhat similar experiences. And it is by applying these that we are able to deal with the new; but it is in the application of the old principle to the new situations that we come to understand better and so redefine the principles themselves.

In our religious life it is the old that interprets the new and it is the new that gives richer significance and greater value to the old. Is the God of Mount Sinai and of the desert still able to be God of the hills and valleys of Canaan? Can he conquer the new enemies? Can he cause the crops to grow and the rain to fall as he did the manna in the desert? This is what the new will add. Faith in the same God and application of the moral principles that were used in the desert, that is the old.

It is with the significance of this truth that we should enter the new year. We are to meet new temptations and live in new conditions but all is to be by application of those principles which the past has proved and under the guidance of the Lord who has led us hitherto. He who has enjoyed the blessing of wealth is now to exercise his faith in God as he experiences the limitations of poverty. The one who has been strong and active in the service of God is to have a larger revelation of God as in patience he learns "they also serve who only stand and wait," yea, even lie and wait. The lives that during the past year knew only the bright sky and the shining sun, are now to walk in the valley of the shadow, or under the dark and heavy

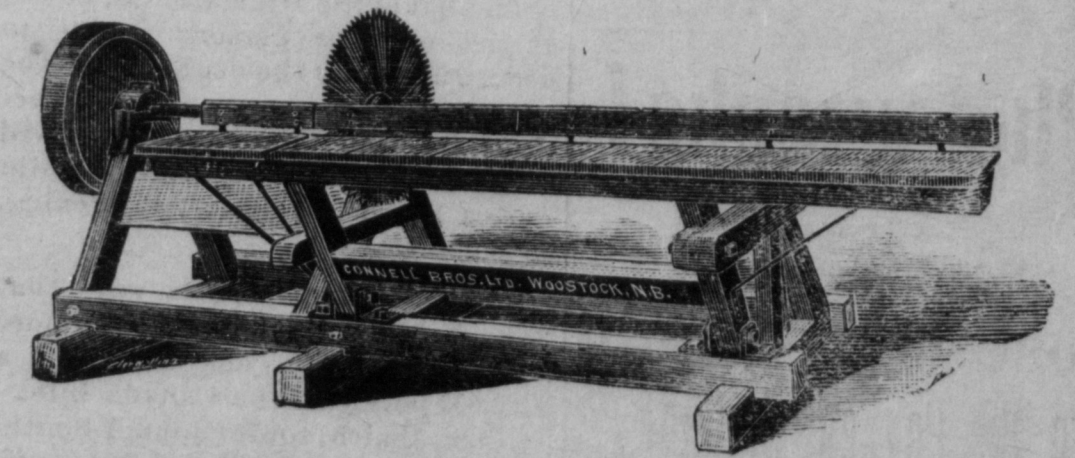
COLLINS MURDER TRIAL
OPENS JAN. 15.

HOPEWILL HILL, N. B., Jan 1
The Attorney General has issued instructions to have fifty additional Jurymen summoned for Collins' murder trial, which will open at Shiretown, on Tuesday, January 15th.

This with the ordinary panel and the members of the Grand Jury, will make 95 Jurymen in attendance. Hon. Mr. Pugsley will himself conduct the case for the Crown, and there will be about 30 witnesses to give evidence.

Collins is taking things quietly in jail, and is said to be gaining in flesh and enjoying the best of health. He reads a good deal and tries his hand some at mechanical work, being just now engaged in the manufacture of a miniature ship to be presented to Constable Coonan.
