SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother) if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such persons residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL.

Our good Tory friends who have so confidently predicted that the government had no intention of constructing the eastern section of the Transcontinental Railway, will no doubt be disappointed in observing that that very soon tenders for the construction of the divisions between Quebec and Grand Falls and from Chipman to Moncton will be invited and that as soon as a decision is reached as to the adoption on the valley or back route, the whole line will be placed under contract.

The business has reached a stage at which even the most ardent Tory doubter is no longer able to cast discredit on the good faith and intention of the government in the matter and this is a condition that will not prove satisfactory to the opponents of the administration.

We have no doubt that months ago the government would have been able to proceed with the work of constructing the eastern section, but that surveys of the Grand Falls—Chipman section were ordered to be made all over again at the instance of the friends of the valley route, who felt that in the earlier survey the engineers had not given sufficient attention to the claims of that route. Victoria, Jan. 1.—Two notable political events have taken place within the past few days. On Saturday evening Hon. R. F. Green, Commissioner of Lands and Works, arrived home on the steamer Charming from the mainland, and at once announced that he had retired from the Ministry and would not again be a candidate for Parliamentary honors in his own riding of Kalso at the forthcoming Provincial general election. Mr. Green assigned no reason for the step beyond the statement that private business made it impossible for him to longer remain in the Administration or in politics, and that he left the Government with a sincere admiration for the Premier.

The other event was the announcement last evening of the dissolution of Parliament, an election on February 2nd and the meeting of the House on March 8th. This last announcement has been almost hourly expected for weeks, although it is probable that had the Premier been permitted to get an immediate appeal to the country he would have an election following closely on his attendance at the Better Terms Conference. There seems little reason to doubt that the Governor took the position that more than a month should elapse between dissolution and an election in a Province presenting such topographical features as British Columbia, and that the Premier in consequence did not get the vote at the time he wanted.

He is ably assisted by William McDade who is also our clerk, and who is around to wait on the men at all hours of the day or night.

Our boss Thomas Dunn is a hustler. He is a jolly good fellow around the camp, and can tell a spruce tree for a mile and knows where to get the logs as well as any man can. Not a very pleasant thing happened to one of our boys last week. Fred Jennings while chopping drove a large bear from his den. Poor Fred was frightened and took to the friendly branches of a tree and there remained until Hanford Gee came and shot the bear, and a large one it was for sure.
