Coun McManus and Fields are running again, and so also is Mr H V Dalling, an eleventh hour candidate last year who came within a very few votes of winning. Dr Ernest S Kirkpatrick, at the urgent request of many electors of all shades of politics, has consented to stand for a seat at the Board. The men apparently in the field are Dr Kirkpatrick, Coun Fields H V Dalling, Coun McManus, H G Noble, W S Sutton, H E Burt, E Hagerman and Coun Fisher.

Meeting at Simonds.

F B Carvell M P addressed an enthusiastic political meeting Wednesday evening in the Hall at Middle Simonds. Wm C Rideout very acceptably acted as Chairman. The attendance was large, and all present seemed to follow the speaker with the keenest attention. Mr Carvell gave a masterly and comprehensive address on both federal and provincial issues. He fully and satisfactorily explained the workings of the Road Law, and refuted the base slanders circulated by the opposition in the federal house. At the close of his address Coun W N Raymond and Andrew McCain were elected delegates to the County Convention, with John N Perry and J W Palmer as substitutes. Liberal prospects in Simonds were never before so bright as they are at present.
