### A GOOD SUGGESTION.

In these days it seems as if the greater portion of political inspiration comes through least expected channels. Other things being equal, the ordinary reader looks to the big dailies for straws indicating the drift of political opinion. The search fails to disclose much of interest. By far the greater part of the sum total of practical suggestion comes from the pages of the more humble journals. Prominent in the list, possibly in a class by itself, is that excellent religious weekly, *The New Freeman*, which owes so much of its interesting character to the contributions by "Onlooker". In his last number that writer gives prominence to the views of a leading Westmorland Liberal respecting the reorganization of the local government. This gentleman urges the creation of a new portfolio, the departmental head of which is to be styled Minister of Education, and as the name signifies, to have general control of the educational affairs of this province. He states truly that half the provinces of Canada already have such a portfolio, and that the plan works admirably. We believe this suggestion is one of the best that possibly could be made. Our modesty will not prevent us mentioning right here the fact that more than a year ago *THE SENTINEL* strongly advocated the establishment of an Educational portfolio. We said at the time, and now repeat the assertion, that the responsible head of the largest spending department of the province should be on the floors of the house. The spokesman for the Educational department should be in a position to meet the critics face to face. We have the fullest confidence in the present Chief Superintendent of Education, yet we believe he could do even better work if he were a Minister of the Crown, directly responsible to the people. As to the suggestion made in our contemporary that Hon. Mr. Jones should become the first New Brunswick Minister of Education, we may say that the honor would be a great one, and doubtless the man would do honor to the position, yet there is possibly little likelihood of his acceptance. There are those who contend we already have too many cabinet officials. If we are to have another it should be for Education. We believe the Legislature would be practically unanimous in viewing with favor any honest effort to better the educational condition.

### The Valley Line.

Hon Wm Pugsley arrived home from Toronto on Tuesday. Talking with a reporter Mr Pugsley said he had seen Messrs Mackenzie & Mann while away and that they have the report of Engineer Stewart, who came here with Mr G G Ruel to look over the proposed valley railroad route. Mr Pugsley said they were delighted with the outlook presented for traffic, both locally and as an outlet for their transcontinental line. The route through northern Maine would give them the shortest line to St John, which is their desire to make their winter port. The only difficulties at all are in connection with the grade. It is desired to secure a grade of 5-10 of 1 per cent to the mile and this means additional expense in the way of construction. Mr Pugsley said it will be necessary to secure some modifications of the agreement, the nature of which he was not able to go into at the moment, but he will at once take the affair up with the government. Asked if the matter would delay the work Hon Mr Pugsley said No, if the government approve of the suggested modifications in the agreement Messrs Mackenzie & Mann will arrange to begin their engineering work at once so that it can be pushed forward and as much preliminary work as possible done before the next session of the legislature, when the new contract can be made. Dr Pugsley, in closing the interview, repeated that the great railroad builders are delighted with the reports of the outlook for the new line.

### The Telephone Co.

The merger was completed at a meeting held in Fredericton on Monday. S H White of Sussex is President, Senator Thompson first Vice-President, and Alfred Seely Secretary. F B Carvell M P is one of the fifteen Directors. The Company will spend this summer about \$15,000 installing the new system in Woodstock, on which the work has been going on for some weeks. The town will soon have a service which for efficiency never has had an equal. The citizens seem to appreciate the effort the Company is making to give satisfaction.

### A Win for the Cubs.

Monday night a good game was played at the Island to determine whether the Cubs or the Broadways should occupy the cellar position in the league standing. The South Siders, seen going down the ladder quite rapidly for some time, and in spite of a big effort to brace up, hit the concrete with a dull thud. The struggle was a nice one, having many spectacular, not to mention amusing, situations. Roy McLauchlan and Eb Jones were the opposing twirlers, and while both did good work, the honors clearly went to Mack Jones, a very good arm but somehow the batters usually connect at the critical juncture. The Broadway boys jumped into the lead in the second inning when Jones and C McLean safely crossed the plate. Again in the fifth they got another brace, but that ended their scoring. The Cubs were blanked in the first two innings, but scored in each of the remaining innings. The most spectacular play was in the fourth. Pickel picked out a nice one and sent it clean over the wire fence. Dave Slipp was cavorting in right field, and made a flying leap to scale the barrier. Very unfortunately he was suspended in mid-air for a second or two, but later secured the ball in time to hold the batter at third. After temporary repairs the struggle was resumed.

### It's up to the C P R.

DEAR EDITOR:—  
We notice in your last week's paper an article stating that New Brunswick has not advanced in manufacturing as the other provinces have. It is important that the output of not only factories but farms be moved off rapidly and in the present condition of business this can only be done by Railway. At the present time business and farmers are confronted with a very serious problem. Ever since February there has been a car shortage on the C P R north of Woodstock. Very few business concerns have been able to get cars enough to ship more than half their product. The rest is piled up awaiting cars. Of course before the cars get here some of these orders will be cancelled, thus leading to serious loss. At the present time the C P R are not moving more than one-half the ordinary freight which is being offered. Now we have the prospect of harvesting this fall ten times as large a crop of potatoes as was gathered last fall, and this means that in September, October and November ten times as many cars will be required to move the potato crop as were used last year. Now if the C P R is not moving the ordinary freight which is offering in June and July, what can we expect when the potato crop is ready to ship. The C P R has a surplus of \$20,000,000.00, has been heavily bonused by the Government, and has no competitor here, and it certainly looks as if they should put some of this money into new cars and engines and move the freight that is offered to them here. The question of good times in this county is absolutely in the hands of the C P R. If they furnish the cars to move our product times will be good for another year at least or perhaps longer. This is a matter which interests every single individual.
