John Graham.

On Sunday evening one of the leading citizens of this town passed away in the person of John Graham, aged 57 years. Deceased for nearly ten years had been a sufferer from paralysis.

He leaves a wife and one daughter at home, and five sisters, Mrs E Lindow, Woodstock; Mrs Burns Gibson, Lynn, Mass; Mrs W R Pipes, Presque Isle; Mrs Harry Stobie, Aitken, Minn; and Miss Letitia Graham, Presque Isle.

For a great many years Mr Graham had been in the grocery business, and by the exercise of prudent and careful management, became possessed of considerable means. For several terms he sat in the Town Council, and was also a member of the County Council for a lengthy period. In religion he was a Presbyterian, and in politics a Conservative. He was also identified with the Masons, the Oddfellows and the Royal Arcanum. For a period of eleven years he had acted as U. S. Vice-Consul, up to his resignation in 1904.

The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon, from his late residence, at half past two. An unusually large number attended. A former pastor, Rev James Ross of St John, Rev Kenneth McKay of Houlton, and Rev A Hastings Kearney officiated. At the grave the beautiful Masonic service was read. The remains were enclosed in a magnificent gray broadcloth casket, with French gray silver trimmings. Undertakers Day and Brewer were in charge.

The pall-bearers were Messrs E Lindow, J R Lindow, Warren Lindow, W R Pipes, Harry Pipes and Hugh Pipes, all relatives of deceased. Numerous beautiful floral tributes were received, among the number being a wreath from Mrs Graham, harp with broken string from Miss Annie Graham, wreath from Miss Letitia Graham, wreath from E Lindow, wreath from Mr and Mrs J R Lindow, and square and compass from the Masonic Lodge. Very many friends from a distance came to town to attend the funeral, and flags were at half mast over the American Consulate and the Oddfellows Hall.

The late Mr Graham was one of the sturdy, upright men, whom any community can ill-afford to lose. Very deep sympathy is felt for the sorrowing relatives.
