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Bourassa Beaten.

Poor Henri Bourassa! Alas for the Lion of Labelle! He essayed to beard the pride of Bellechasse in the den of the latter, and came out of the contest a political wreck. The sturdy peasants preferred the son of the habitant, born and reared in their midst, to the son of the seigneur, even though it was the scion of the mighty Papineau himself. The struggle was a duel to the death. Hon Adolard Turgeon, fresh from vindication in the courts, sought the verdict of his electors. Hurling a challenge to his chief adversary, Turgeon calmly awaited the attack with confidence in his own integrity, and in his ability to prove before his people, even in the presence of his great opponent, the utter falsity of the attacks to which he has been subject.

Supported by the chief Conservative workers in the county, and others from outside including Senator Landry, Hon T Chase Casgrain, Hon Thos Chapais, and Hon P E LeBlanc, Bourassa and his Nationalist friends stormed the county from end to end, but in vain. The electors returned Turgeon by well up to a thousand majority, the greatest in the history of the constituency.

The Conservative party as a serious factor in Quebec politics has ceased to exist. This much was long ago conceded. It is from the issue of the Battle of Bellechasse that we learn of the overthrow of the chief cause of trouble within the Liberal ranks.

To complete the political extermination of Bourassa, Turgeon might well afford to follow him back to Labelle and there wrest from him the right to sit in the parliament at Ottawa, a privilege he has enjoyed for years and only laid down but a few weeks ago in order to offer opposition to Hon Mr Turgeon in the local arena.

A man sometimes gets that which he richly deserves, even in this world. This will be the popular verdict on the Bellechasse incident.
