### Hints for Pancake Making.

A good way to prepare the pan for  
pancakes, fritters and such things,  
is to put the butter in a clean cloth,  
and rub the little bundle all over the  
pan. The heat, melting the butter,  
will let just enough through the  
cloth to butter evenly and prevent  
waste. For the pancakes themselves,  
there is an increasing use of Blended

### THE 'KUSKAGAMUTES.'

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov 6.—Dr Geo  
B Gordon, curator of the department  
of American archaeology of the Uni-  
versity of Pennsylvania, who reach-  
ed this city to-day after penetrating  
the Alaskan wilderness for 2,000 miles  
on the 'Mrs O C Harrison Expedition,'  
reports the discovery of a small tribe  
of aborigines, hitherto unknown to  
ethnologists. Dr Gordon calls these  
unknown American inhabitants  
'Kuskagamutes.' He brought here a  
collection of their clothing, arms,  
utensils, etc. The tribe was found  
about 800 miles from the mouth of  
the Kuskokwim river, and they were  
few in number. This people, Dr Gor-  
don says, came of Athabascan stock,  
but have been conquered by the  
Eskimos and have almost been ab-  
sorbed by them. They retain many  
of the ancient characteristics in  
speech and dress. Instead of wear-  
ing furs, like the Eskimos, they make  
the skins of loons and other great  
birds into robes for clothing.

### A Veteran Walker's Feat.

Portland, Me., Nov 6.—Planning to  
duplicate his feat of forty years ago,  
of walking to Chicago, a distance of  
1,230 miles, in 26 days, Edward Pay-  
son Weston started at 5 o'clock to-  
night from the Portland post-office  
amid the cheers and good wishes of  
fully one thousand people who had  
gathered to see his start. He is 69  
years of age. Mr Weston was greet-  
ed by a number of friends, including  
former Mayor James P Baxter, who  
had watched his departure forty  
years ago, and was accompanied to  
the South Portland city line by  
Joseph O Sterling, who, as a police  
officer, escorted him over the same  
route on the first walk. Mayor Clif-  
ford witnessed his departure and ad-  
ministered an oath that the condi-  
tions of the feat, had been complied  
with. Mr Weston expects to arrive  
at the Chicago post-office at 2 p m on  
Thursday, Nov 30, averaging about  
fifty miles a day. He will go by way  
of Boston, Troy, Utica, Syracuse,  
Buffalo, Toledo and Cleveland. There  
was an arrangement for Henry  
Schmehl, of Chicago, to start at the  
same time for Portland.
