The result was all that the most sanguine supporters of that ticket could hope for. Indeed it was freely admitted after the fight that no such sweeping success was expected. On the other hand the losers took their defeat with equanimity, and no doubt feel quite happy at being left at home to mind their own affairs.

All day long the candidates and their workers were busy, but as night wore on experienced campaigners clearly anticipated the totals. It was evident that the Citizens had swept the deck.

The vote was a big one. At the Up-Stair poll in the Town Hall out of a possible 254, all but 35 voted.

An analysis of the count may prove interesting. At that poll there were sixty three straight ticket ballots for the Citizens, and twenty four for their opponents. The remainder consisted of all the possible combinations one could work out. Candidate Sutton's name was on nearly everyone's ballot it seemed. He certainly walked away from the others, and led at every poll. The other boxes worked out in about the same manner. The straight ticket conservative voted solidly for the Citizens ticket. Some of the more radical liberals adhered solidly to the opposing quintette, but the bulk of the ballots were split.

At the Town Hall the victors made brief addresses, each man promising to serve the citizens faithfully and well, independent of any party or clique. Ex-Couns Fields and McManus and Mr Dalling made graceful little speeches as well. The best of feeling seemed to prevail.

It is useless to cry over spilt milk but the Sentinel is not going to deny its sense of disappointment. We had confidently looked for the election of at least three candidates who bit the dust, yet in the face of the splendid organization they had to face perhaps nothing but defeat was possible. In view of the somewhat apathetic feeling that premeated all those who were opposing the Citizens, and the advantage that ticket gained by getting a good early start, the vote polled by the defeated candidates cannot be looked upon as anything of which to be ashamed. Certainly Mayor Munro, President Teed and Secretary Balmori are deserving of hearty congratulation. They went to work with a definite purpose in view, and attained the object which they sought. The fact that they were able to detach from the defeated candidates a large measure of liberal support is all the more to their credit as able and resourceful political generals.

W S Sutton, to whom falls the honor of leading the poll, is manager of The Woodstock Woodworking Co. A young man of energy and good sense, he may be depended

upon to give good service to the town. In politics he is an independent conservative, and in religion a Presbyterian. He is also a prominent Mason.

H G Noble, another clever young business man making his first run, landed in second place. He is widely known as proprietor of Noble's Grocery. He is of the right stuff to make a good councillor. In politics he is said to have fairly strong conservative leanings, yet with a considerable breath of view. In religion he is a prominent member of the Reformed Baptist church.

Emerson Hagerman, another new man, is a popular resident of Wellington Ward, being a member of the firm of Connell Bros. He is pretty well liked by everybody, and should make a good town father. He has no particular political leanings, is a prominent Mason, and a Baptist.

H E Burt is another of the solid business men of the town. He has had considerable municipal experience, and after a voluntary rest of a couple of years, returns to the council. He is a conservative, an Odd-fellow, and in religion is known as a staunch Baptist.

Isaiah W Fisher is, we believe, a native of Queens County, from which so many good men have gone forth. He has been a councillor for three years, and seems "to get there" each time the people have a say. He is employed with Small & Fisher Ltd. Like his colleague Coun Burt he is conservative, a Baptist, and a member of the Oddfellow.

Alexander Dunbar sr, needs no introduction. He is known to everybody as perhaps the first machinist in the province, and proprietor of one of the town's leading industries. He now begins his second term. He is not a politician in the ordinary sense of the term, as he votes for the man rather than the party. Whatever political leanings he may have are said to be rather in sympathy with the Liberals. He is a Presbyterian.

Of the defeated, we prefer to post pone their obituary notices. We know that "Truth crushed to earth will rise again." Likewise they may yet be heard from.

The Sentinel offers its hearty congratulations to the Mayor and Council. They have everything in their favor. The town will look for a year of deeds rather than words. If they live up to their promises we shall be the first to hold up both hands in their favor. We never yet have been afraid to condemn that which in our humble opinion did not appear fair to the public, and in future we shall not depart from our past record. In like manner we shall not refrain from giving credit where it is due. The new council has the floor.
