E Tennyson Smith opened his campaign Tuesday night in the Opera House. Rev Dr Kierstead was in the chair. Seated on the platform were Mayor Munro, several local clergymen, and ladies of the W C T U. The Mayor extended a cordial greeting on behalf of the corporation.

Tennyson Smith replied, and after some singing launched into his first lecture, taking as his subject "The Curtain Lifted" portraying the comedy and the tragedy of intemperance. The address was listened to with marked attention. At the close several took the pledge. Wednesday night Rev Mr Fulton presided. A mixed quartet rendered appropriate music. Mr Smith spoke on "The Drink Demon." This lecture, concluding with his famous interview with the drink fiend was a marvellous impersonation of the evil. Scores signed the pledge. Saturday night will be taken up with a discourse on "Up with the Drunkard and down with the Saloon." Rev S A Baker will preside. Sunday will witness two grand rallies, in the afternoon at three o'clock and a grand joint meeting after church. The Mayor is to act as Chairman. Monday the climax will be reached in the great "Trial of Alcohol." Mayor Munro will be judge, C L Smith clerk of court, James Woolverton Constable, Tennyson Smith Counsel for prosecution and Marvin L Hayward lawyer for the defence. Several witnesses will be called, and a jury of well-known citizens will be empanelled. The nominal fee of 25 cents will be charged for this entertainment. Tennyson Smith is a wonderful man. He is the inveterate foe of the Liquor Traffic. His burning words carry conviction. He is world renowned. Do not miss the opportunity of hearing him.
