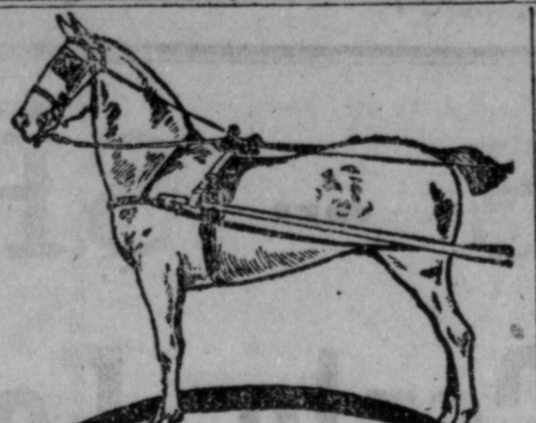

REV. DR. KIERSTED'S
Sunday Evening Sermon.

TEXT. Luke 9: 58-61. Subject: The Paramount Demands of the Kingdom.

Jesus had taken his final departure from Galilee, had just been driven out from a City of Samaria, and is now upon the road again with his face to Jerusalem, and with the shadow of the cross already upon him. And I doubt not that it was the certainty of his immediate persecution and death that constrained Jesus at this time to make the conditions of discipleship so self-sacrificing and severe. We must then keep in mind the situation under which the three men mentioned in our text met Jesus. The first recorded offering to become his disciples is a Scribe—one of the most learned and most highly honored men of the nation, one that any political leader would be flattered to win and anxious to conciliate. He offers allegiance with great enthusiasm, saying, "Master, I will follow thee whithersoever thou goest." But Christ declines his proffered discipleship, replying, "The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have their nests but the Son of Man hath not where to lay his head." In this Jesus refers not so much to his poverty as to the necessities of his mission which made him a homeless wanderer. And he intimates that an impulsive discipleship will not endure the hardships of his life.

Another man who has evidently been a pupil of Jesus during his stay in Galilee, and who yet wishes to cling to him without making the sacrifices necessary to follow him to Jerusalem requests leave to go home for a few days to set things in order and bid them farewell. But Jesus, seeing him as irresolute and vacillating as the other was impulsive and hasty, virtually rejects him also, answering by the old proverb, "He that putteth his hand to the plow and looketh back is not fit for the Kingdom."

Then Jesus turning to another disciple says to him, "Follow thou me." And he answers, "Lord, suffer me first to go and bury my father." This seems to us a very reasonable request and we would expect Jesus, the minister of sympathy and comfort and tenderness, not only to grant the request but to offer some aid in the affliction. Instead he replies in words that seem unnecessarily harsh, "Follow thou me." "Let the dead,"—that is, the spiritual dead, those who have never heard the call of the Kingdom,—bury their own dead,"—there are plenty of them to attend to that,—but go thou,"—thou to whom hast come the vision of the new Kingdom,—and preach the kingdom of God." The text seems to imply that the father was then lying dead but some have thought that the son meant that he was ill or old, liable to die any time and to need his care and attention in death and burial. We have only a bit of the conversation here and we may be sure that Jesus saw something in the man which justified his reply. We are to remember the extraordinary mission of Jesus, and that this mission was now nearing its close, that Jesus was passing through the country for the last time, and allowing several days for the funeral and for the purification which custom demanded, the opportunity of this man to be with the human Jesus would have gone forever. Just as on this same journey Jesus told the rich young man to part with all his wealth and follow him to Jerusalem so here he may have given to this man a more severe test. There are times and situations when even the sacred rites of the burial of our dead have to be left to others. Such was the case of Nogi when his son fell in the siege of Port Arthur, and of Captain Capron when his son fell in the charge of the rough riders, and he passed on with a "Well done, my son." Many a missionary of Jesus since then has left to others the burial of aged and revered parents. In ordinary circumstances we may be sure that Jesus would send such a man back to his home for Jesus knew the value of the home and loved his own. It was he that championed the rights of the home and lifted up his

voice against the hypocritical custom of calling possessions "Corban," that is, sacred to the Temple and not to be used for secular needs. To care for one's parents, he declared, was a more sacred duty than the Temple service and could not be neglected. His own mother was very near to him and he thought of her even in his dying moments. But he knew also that the Kingdom of God must have supreme allegiance and he gave that regardless of the wishes of his family, even of his mother. When they seek to dissuade him from teaching and try to lead him away he turns from them and declares to his listeners, "He that doeth the will of my Father which is in Heaven the same is my mother or my brother or my sister." He gave up the only occupation by which he could support his mother and earn his own living for the work of the Kingdom and he pursued his teaching though he knew it meant to his mother the awful agony of watching him die as a malefactor upon the cross. And if he demanded of others the subordination of the home to the Kingdom it was what he had already given in his own life.

The general teaching of these incidents, then, may be summed up in this statement: A man can enter into and become a useful member of the Kingdom of God only as he accepts that Kingdom by an act of deliberate choice as the paramount value of his life, and subordinates all other values to it or harmonizes them with it.

That Jesus regarded the Kingdom of God as the supreme value of life is manifest everywhere in his own life and permeates his entire teaching. We need only mention two parables of Jesus, that of the hidden treasure in the field and of the pearl of great price to see how clearly this truth is expressed by him. All other possessions the man had are sold to purchase the field with the hidden treasure, all the pearls of the merchant are sacrificed for the pearl of great price. That is the supreme value in which all the other values are merged. These other values are not lost, the man still has his property transformed in the hidden treasure, his many pearls in the one of priceless value—they are transformed into higher meaning and significance for life. The other values of life must be subordinated and transformed by the supreme value of the Kingdom, they must be harmonised with it.

And with most of us it is the good which is the enemy of the best. It is only the very wicked and base man who will hold evil and good together and hesitate between them. But it is a common temptation to be satisfied with the good when we are offered the best, to be commonplace when we can be heroic, to be just when we can be merciful, to do a good deed when we might do a noble one. The temptation of Jesus illustrates this for it was a struggle between the good and the best.

This temptation has been the subject of many paintings by the older artists and in many cases we have realistic representations. The Devil is often represented as repulsive, as the incarnation of hideousness and baseness and evil. But one of these artists with much more spiritual insight gives to him the form and features and garb of a monk, and it is not till he is finally repulsed and turns away that he discloses his true nature. And by this the painter did not mean to disparage the monk for he lived in the mediaeval age when the monk was the highest type of saintliness but he meant to declare that the temptation of Jesus came from all that was highest and holiest in his age. It was the religious faith of his mother, the expectation of his disciples. It was the Messianic hope of Mary and Simeon, of John the Baptist and the beloved John and the impulsive Peter—a noble and exalted religious ideal—that tempted Jesus, but it was a temptation of the evil one when it sought to take the place of that Messianic ideal which the Father had revealed to his own soul alone. It was the good that was the enemy of the best.

And to go bury a dead father is a pious and filial act that must not be neglected unless it should keep a man from going with the Christ to Jerusalem and Calvary. How many missionaries of the Cross have gone with Jesus and left another to bury their dead. And how many others the Master has called and meant to lead them up "new Calvaries with the cross that turns not back," but they like this disciple of old lost the opportunity in order to bury an aged parent. The home is the purest and most sacred spot outside the Kingdom of God and is meant to minister to the Kingdom and yet it is possible by the substitution of the home for the Kingdom, to allow it to become a temptation of the Devil.
