POLITICAL.

York County Liberals are soon to meet in Convention to nominate a federal as well as local candidates. The early bird generally catches the worm.

The King is dead, long live the King! To-day Joseph Fewer lays down the duties of Superintendent of Water Works, and James Carr assumes the position.

Some folk say the Liberals are without rising men in the province of Ontario. What's the matter with Mr Pardee, Mr McKay, Mr Pense, Mr Graham, Mr Preston and Duncan Ross?

Altogether apart from the merits or the demerits of the Contract with the Dam Company, they certainly are giving a splendid service with the street lights, something of which the most fastidious inhabitant cannot complain.

Duncan Ross, son of Senator George W Ross, carried the contest for his father's old seat in the Middlesex by-election of last week. Young Ross is the worthy son of an illustrious sire, is possessed of oratorical gifts of a high order, and bids fair to eventually rival his father, who stands next to Sir Wilfrid as the best platform speaker in Canada.

Councillor Williams' motion, which was passed by the Convention, renders it perfectly in order for any conservative who feels like doing so, to cast the whole or a portion of his franchise in the Liberal interest. The Councillor probably wished to render it easy for the many conservatives in his own parish who make no bones about supporting Harry Carvell.

Down in Charlotte the Liberals are said to be hopeful of downing the Opposition ticket, whoever they may be. Of course Grimmer and Clarke will run again, but Hart is likely to retire. Hon Geo F Hill will presumably decline another term. Mr Byron and Mr Mills are pretty sure to be on the Government ticket, and their nomination will be just about equivalent to election.

Cheering word comes from the prairie province, now in the throes of a local election. The little Liberal band of seven in the last house of forty are full of hope. They are fighting so well that Premier Roblin is clearly on the run, and the only thing that can possibly save him is the unlimited use of rum and money. The Liberal leader, Mr Edward Brown, is doing yeoman service, and there is some hope that he may accomplish the herculean task of ousting the government.

A great many of our good conservative friends are shivering in their boots owing to the presence on the government ticket of that bright and popular young Liberal, Mr Andrew McCain. The are so badly frightened that all sorts of reasons are being put in circulation why that gentleman should not be a candidate. One such tale is so utterly base as to suggest that the Carvells will knife Mr McCain. Of course this is arrant nonsense. Mr McCain and his friends know full well that he will have no more earnest supporters than the Carvell family.
