

Letter re Sunday Bill.

To The Chief of Police of Woodstock, NB; SIR;—I beg to englose you herewith a copy of the Dominion Lord's Day Act, and also list of the Provincial Lord's Day Acts, includ-ing the New Brunswick Statute passed before Confederation, and which is still in force in

You will observe that by Sec 15 of the Dominion Lord's Day Act is provided that "no action or prosecution for a violation of this Act shall be commenced without the leave of the Attorney General for the Province in which the offence is alleged to have been committed, nor after the expiration of sixty days from the time of the commission of the

days from the time of the commission of the alleged offence."

As this Act will come into force on the first of March next, I have thought it well to send you a copy, and also to inform you that if you will call my attention to any violation of the Statute which comes under your notice and furnish me with the particulars of such violation, I shall give the same immediate attention. I feel that I can rely with confidence upon you, and upon other efficials in your community who have to do with the administration of the law, to take the necessary steps to prevent an infringement of its provisions. The intention of Parliament in passing the Act was to secure, as far as may provisions. The intention of Parliament in passing the Act was to secure, as far as may be reasonably possible, a proper observance of the Lord's Day, and it is the duty of all good citizens to themselves obey the law and and to assist in preventing a violation thereof by others. Making it clearly understood that you and the officers under you will feel it to be your duty to insist upon a compliance with the Statute will go far toward ensuring a respect for its provisions, and so relieve you of the necessity of instituting prosecutions. Whenever, however, such prosecutions should become necessary you will, I am sure, not fail in your duty in this regard.
