### Letter re Sunday Bill.

To The Chief of Police of Woodstock, N.B.:  
SIR:—I beg to enclose you herewith a copy  
of the Dominion Lord's Day Act, and also  
list of the provisions of the said Act in-  
cluding the New Brunswick Statute passed before  
Confederation, and which is still in force in  
this Province.  
You will observe that by Sec 15 of the Do-  
minion Lord's Day Act is provided that "no  
action or prosecution for violation of this  
Act shall be commenced without the leave of  
the Attorney General for the Province in  
prosecutions which are alleged to have been  
committed, nor after the expiration of sixty  
days from the time of the commission of the  
alleged offence."  
As this Act will come into force on the first  
of March next, I have thought it well to send  
you a copy, and also to inform you that if  
you will call my attention to any violation  
of the Statute which comes under your notice  
and furnish me with the particulars of such  
violation, I shall be glad to take the neces-  
sary steps to prevent an infringement of its  
provisions. The intention of Parliament in  
passing the Act was to secure, as far as  
reasonably possible, a proper observance  
of the Lord's Day, and it is the duty of all  
citizens to themselves and to the public  
and to assist in preventing a violation there-  
of by others. Making it clearly understood  
that you and the officers under you will feel  
it to be your duty to insist upon a com-  
pliance with the Statute will go far toward en-  
suring its observance. Whenever, however,  
such prosecutions should become necessary you  
will, I am sure, not fail in your duty in this  
regard.
