SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such persons residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

THE LONDON SEAT.

The liberals of London, Ont., held a convention on Thursday to select a candidate for the seat in the House of Commons made vacant by the resignation of Hon. C. S. Hyman, and decided, as was of course expected, to nominate Mr. Hyman. The conservatives have not yet taken any concerted action, but they have practically agreed to put Mr. Gray in the field again as Mr. Hyman's opponent. Mr. Gray has twice contested the constituency with the Minister of Public Works—first at the general election and afterwards when Mr. Hyman accepted office. He polled a surprisingly large vote in 1904, but was defeated by a good majority in the later contest. It was events connected with this election that caused Mr. Hyman to resign his seat. Mr. Gray is now a resident of Toronto, but apparently residence in a constituency is not insisted upon very largely in Ontario or Quebec. Should the election be called on at an early date Mr. Hyman will not be able to take part in it, for he is still in delicate health. But from present appearances the contest cannot take place for some time, because of the action taken in the House of Commons the other day at the suggestion of the leader of the opposition. Some question had been raised about the form of Mr. Hyman's resignation, and as to events connected with it, and on Mr. Borden's motion the matter was referred to the committee on privileges and elections. While this matter is pending, the election cannot take place. It is not very clear what advantage is gained by this step. It was demanded that Mr. Hyman should resign because of the corrupt acts of some of his supporters. He did resign, and now there is trouble regarding the way in which the papers were made out. Whatever other effect this course will have it will at least postpone what the opposition have been insisting upon—an appeal to the people of London—which will decide whether they approve or disapprove of Mr. Hyman's course as a public man.
