Greater Oak Hall.

B B Manzer seems to believe in expansion. His place of business is ever enlarging, and now has three entrances—Main, King and Wellington Streets. Mr Manzer is a very successful man. He combines with natural business instinct the rare quality of making his customers his staunch friends, and though a consistent and satisfied user of printer's ink, the proprietor of Oak Hall aims to make his customers his best advertisement. He is essentially a self-made man, who shortly after coming to Woodstock thirty years ago became manager of the Belyea business, a comparatively small store with two clerks, and about 1600 square feet of floor space. To-day Mr Manzer employs 12 hands, and has a floor space of over 7000 feet.

In 1884 the proprietorship of the business was assumed by Mr Manzer, and in a short time he took over the Merritt store in the rear of the Main Street shop, with entrance on Wellington Street, but even this was not sufficient. Some months ago a lease was obtained of the H Paxton Baird King Street store, carpenters, painters and decorators put to work, and now the new branch, devoted almost entirely to the men's department, is open for business. In the first flat there will be found hat cases, silent salesmen, clothing wardrobe with a very large and ingeniously placed triple mirror, finished in oak and lighted with electricity. The second storey will be utilized for clothing, trunks, etc. etc, and contains a nicely fitted room. The more expensive brands of clothing are in the beautiful down stair wardrobe. A feature of the shop is the improved Lamson cash carrier system, with eight carriers. There are eight arc-lights in the building of 160 candle power, as well as numerous clusters and individual incandescents. Ample fire protection is secured by means of iron connecting doors.

Oak Hall is so well-known that anything we can say of it would be superfluous. The public are well aware of the splendid goods to be had therein. The clerks are most assiduous in trying to please the most fastidious patrons. From the proprietor down, there is an air of civility and attention in even the most minute matters. The people of this town and the country round about know full well how to appreciate the delights of shopping in Oak Hall.

Florenceville.

Florenceville is a thriving town about 24 miles from the Capital of Car Co, situated on both sides of the St John, and formerly known as "Buttermilk Creek." Florence Nightingale, dear yet to the hearts of all, is supposed to have transformed this obnoxious cognomen. Whether the town at the early period had an opulence of Buttermilk, (which your scribe cannot ascertain) it has at a later period flowed freely in that evaporating fluid known as booze.

Search of early records shows that the above mentioned liquid was at that time freely bartered for shaved shingles. Past history also points out that in 97, this burg was the only one north of the Capital to celebrate the anniversary of our late Queen. Celebrations are now limited to an occasional street parade (with the usual side dishes), and mid night revelries so luridly pictured in recent temperance work. The industries are varied and numerous; fishing, farming, lumbering and chicken raising; life insurance and horse trading are only side issues. In earlier days the Bank was irreverently broken into and busted, and old timers are even now prophesying that after election some deposited capital is going to be badly bent. Politics and cash go hand in hand. The street scenes have often been described, everything is lively, politicians can daily be seen, pictures of the twin cities have often been taken and brave hearts have even "post-carded" them,—they show a bridge, bunches of bushes and white spots.

Unfortunately the spots were never labelled "these are houses." The East side at one time tried to change its name to Manchester, but Manchester N B looked too much like Manchester N H. That the change was not made is still worrying the West-side;—they claim their present name isn't big enough for both. Smithmackane has been proposed but they say it won't stand a show. Brilliant amateurs are here said to be found—the stage, base-ball, and crackman world having been the losers. (Note Crackman means "a proficient rifleman or woman.") and for the benefit of travellers, the "Tourist Assn" has prepared guide books of information, we quote from one.

Our East Hotel is now running, we can promise you good accommodations, pleasant drives are here for you, go and view, the consolidated school, The Bad Lands on Shannondale,—New England, The Depot and Buckwheat Bridge. More Sufferers.

In addition to the firms mentioned on first page it must not be forgotten that many merchants along the north side of Main Street suffered considerable loss and much inconvenience by reason of the late conflagration. Mrs J Loane had one plate front smashed;—the same fate befell one of the large windows of the Sheasgreen Pharmacy;—H G Noble's plate front, said to be the largest in the Maritime Provinces, also was cracked; the Corkery building was somewhat charred, and also there was considerable injury to the Lindsay block.

LORD'S DAY ACT NOW IN FORCE.

Canada's new Sunday observance law, known as the Lord's Day Act, provides for a strict observance of the day, but is not calculated to work on any class.

The act says: "It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's day, except as provided herein, or in any provincial act or law now or hereafter in force, to sell or offer for sale or purchase any goods, chattels or other personal property, or any real estate, or to carry on or transact any business of his ordinary calling or in connection with such calling, or for gain to do, or employ any other person to do, on that day any work, business or labor."

It is expressly stated, however that works of necessity and mercy are not prohibited. This permits of the sale of drugs and medicines, the conduct of the passenger business of the railroads, the transmission of telegrams and telephone messages, the care and handling, of perishable products and live animals, any emergency work to save property from destruction or serious injury, the carrying of the mails, and the work of domestic servants and watchmen.

All games, performances and entertainments at which an admission fee is charged are prohibited. The sale of newspapers, both domestic and foreign is prohibited. Street car traffic, except in the case of international or interprovincial lines now in operation, will be unlawful.

The following is a brief summary of the act—the more important sections being alluded to:

Sec. 1 (a) "The Lord's Day" means the period of time which begins at 12 o'clock Saturday afternoon and ends at 12 o'clock on the following afternoon.

Sec. 2. It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day to sell or offer for sale or purchase any goods, chattels, etc, or to do or employ any other person to do on that day any work, business or labor.

Sec. 3. This sections allows any person on the Lord's Day to do any work of necessity or mercy which includes.

(a) Any necessary or customary work in connection with divine worship.

(b) Work for relief of sickness and suffering, including the sale of drugs and medicines and surgical appliances by retail.

(c) Necessary transmitting or delivering of telegraph or telephone messages.

(d) Starting or maintaining fires, making repairs to furnaces and repairs in cases of emergency, etc, and another sub-section including "The conveying of travellers and work incidental thereto."

Sec. 5. "It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day, except as provided in the Provincial Act, or law now or hereafter in force to engage in any public games or contest for gain or for any prize or reward, or to be present thereat, or to provide, engage in or be present at when any fee is charged, etc."

Sec. 6. It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day, except as provided in any Provincial Act, or law now or hereafter in force, to run, conduct or convey by any mode of conveyance, any excursion on which persons are conveyed for hire, and having for its only object the carriage on that day of such passengers for amusement or pleasure, and passengers so conveyed shall not be deemed to be travellers within the meaning of the act.

Sec. 8 says: "It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day to shoot with or use any gun, rifle or

other similar engine, either for gain or in such a manner or in such places, as to disturb other persons in attendance at public worship, or in the observance of that day.

Sec 10 says: the fine shall not be less than \$1 and not more than \$40, with the cost of the prosecution, for each offence by any one person.

Section 11 deals with the employer who authorizes or directs anything to be done in violation of the act "The fine shall in such a case not exceed \$100, and be not less than \$20, in addition to any other penalty prescribed by law for the same offence."
