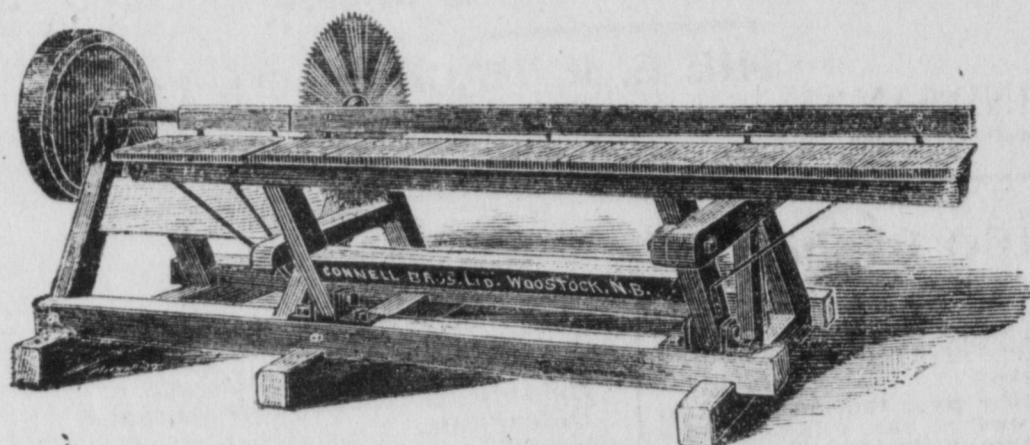

### THE TEACHERS.

The New Brunswick Teachers' Union has presented the following ultimatum to the Provincial Government:—

First.—No further issuance of local licenses; and cessation, as soon as possible, of the further issuance of third class licenses, all of the latter at present in force, to remain so during the pleasure of the Board of Education or Inspectors.

Second.—Each parish (so far as may be found practicable) to constitute a single school district with a school board elected or appointed as the legislature may determine. Among the important duties of the parish school board would be the grouping of the present districts and the establishing of central graded schools wherever the conditions would permit, the employment of competent teachers and the local supervision of all the schools of the parish by the agency of a paid secretary. The minimum rate of assessment should not be less than one half of one per cent of the assessable valuation of the parish. The sum thus raised, supplemented by the county fund grant and a special provincial grant for poor parishes equal to the amount now paid to poor districts, would, in our opinion, be sufficient to provide much better school privileges for all of the children than many of them now enjoy. It would assure a more intelligent and effective administration of the law. It would enable the trustees to increase the local salaries of the teachers by at least fifty per cent without imposing too heavy a burden upon any locality.

Third.—The sum of \$40 per year (instead of \$30, as at present) to be paid directly to teachers out of the county fund and that, in order to meet this additional claim upon the fund, the amount levied upon each county to be equal to forty cents for every inhabitant of the county instead of thirty cents as at present.

Fourth.—The provincial grants to teachers of the first and second classes, after two years of service in the public schools, to be increased by ten per cent for the third year, and by a further ten per cent for each additional year thereafter until a maximum is reached of \$200 per year for first class male teachers; \$160 for 2nd class male teachers; \$150 for first class female teachers; \$120 for 2nd class female teachers. Also the provincial grant to principals of superior schools, after two years' service in the superior schools, to be increased by ten per cent each additional year thereafter until a maximum per year of \$350 be reached.

Fifth.—The Legislature to set for all districts (as at present is done for Grammar and Superior Schools) the minimum salaries to be paid teachers by the local school boards.

Sixth.—The inauguration of a Liberal Pension System for Teachers who have served considerable time in the profession, no reduction in regular salaries to be made therefor. Such a provision would encourage more men and women of talent to remain Teachers.

The Acadian Recorder, in an article indirectly touching upon the outrage of two members of the N S Assembly appearing before that body the "worse of liquor" on Friday the 15th ult, gives strong evidence in support of the growth of temperance sentiment over the Dominion, when it says that two distillers would not now be tolerated in the Dominion Cabinet, as they were in the days of Sir John A McDonald's regime.

The constant trickling of the streamlet wears away the hardest stone; and the incessant educating of the public conscience and the hammering away at the liquor traffic by the Prohibitionist have achieved the victory that he have arrived at—the ostracism of the liquor interests from the Council Chambers of this young nation.

The Recorder is not any recognized champion of the Prohibitionists, but we believe that the people of Canada today would not tolerate a distiller in the Dominion ministry, and that our contemporary has correctly gauged public opinion when it asserts such a fact.

In Sir John McDonald's time, say 16 years ago, the people tolerated both a distiller and a brewer in the Canadian Cabinet; today we do not believe Sir Wilfrid Laurier, nor Mr Borden, were he in power, dare take any representative of the liquor business into the Cabinet.

Surely the Prohibitionists, who are ever after more drastic legislation to squelch the liquor interests, have great reason to be satisfied with the progress of temperance sentiment within the last 12 or 15 years.

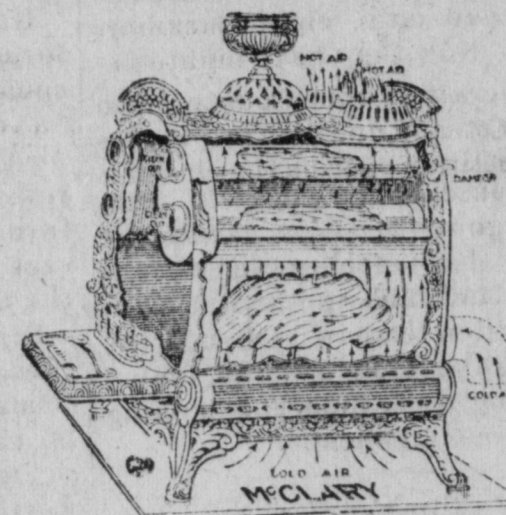
