SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 3 and 25, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon a cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother) if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such persons residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

RARE HEROINE.

The burning of the Protestant School at Hochelaga, near Montreal, was the occasion of a manifestation of heroism as sublime as it has ever been the privilege of the journalist to record. The school was under the charge of a lady principal, Miss Sarah Maxwell. After assisting the other young lady teachers to effect the escape of the pupils on the lower floors, she went alone to the third floor to save the little ones in the kindergarten department. The place was already stifling with heat and smoke, but she had succeeded in handing out all except sixteen when her strength failed, and soon afterwards she was taken out dead with the little ones for whom she had deliberately given her life. There is in such an incident a redemption of pain that enables a sympathetic community to endure the awful tragedy, and helps even the bereaved parents to submit with resignation to their unspeakable loss. Miss Maxwell has erected for herself "a monument more enduring than brass," but the community to which she belonged would honor itself by providing a suitable monument to commemorate her noble self-sacrifice and devotion to duty.
