The Legislature adjourned last night, and will meet again on Tuesday. It is thought the business will be finished in a fortnight.

Postmaster C L Smith expects to leave here on Monday for Alberta, where he has large land holdings. If his present plans are not changed he will remain in the West for a month.

The street commissioner did a good stroke of business, for which he deserves credit, in having a drain cut in the ice along Queen Street. In past years this was generally neglected.

Arthur L Slipp, the brilliant young law student, has entered the office of L Col D McLeod Vince, and will remain as Clerk until the fall, when he expects to resume his course in Dalhousie University Law School.

James McManus, proprietor of the new dry goods store in the Payson Building, began business on Wednesday of last week, with a magnificent line of staple and fancy dress goods. His shop has been well patronized.

A meeting of the Board of Trade was called for Monday evening in the Council chamber, but only four or five showed up, and those present adjourned sine die. It is understood the Telephone question was to have been debated.

The N B Telephone people are putting their new quarters in Queen Street, alongside the SENTINEL office, in good shape. It is now pretty well understood that a central energy system, such as is in vogue in Fredericton, will be installed.

Everett Harold, Customs Officer at Centreville, died on Sunday morning, leaving a wife, one son and three daughters to mourn the loss of a kind husband and an indulgent father.

Mr Harold was a man that made many friends in his business transactions, aiming always to do right by his fellowman. He will be much missed in the community.

C M Sherwood, Centreville, has Miss Bateman and her assistants at work preparing for Millinery opening which will be on the 29th and 30th inst. Miss Bateman had been trimming in St John, for Mr Sherwood, ever since the first inst, and having taken advantage of all the wholesale and retail Millinery openings, will be prepared to please all customers.

Queen Street seems to be taking on new life. The Methodist building recently sold to Dr Camber is in the hands of the carpenters, who are transforming it from genuine ugliness to a thing of beauty, with a magnificent plate front. The shop is to be occupied by Mrs Camber as a millinery stand. Just across the street in the Connell Block James W Astle's fine plate front looks so well that it is reported on good authority the new owners, the Fisher Estate, will put plate fronts in all the offices.

Leader Hazen seems to have had quite a picnic at Oromocto, working the sewage question for all it was worth. It is at least noteworthy that the name of our own aggressive local opposition member, B F Smith, does not appear among the list of those present. Mr Hazen should explain why his brilliant chief of staff was not on hand. Surely Mr Smith was invited.

Hazen and Glasier were renominated for Sunbury County at a Convention which met at Burton on Monday.

The Montreal Star, the only Conservative paper of much weight in the country, has openly branded the present federal Opposition as worse than incompetent. Pretty rough on Borden, Foster, Haggart, et al.

The French constituencies, and also those in which the liquor vote is supreme, were almost a unit in favor of Roblin in the Manitoba elections. What do some of our good conservatives in Carleton County think of this fact?

Mr Hazen, at the Oromocto Convention, as reported in the *Gleaner*, said "No Legislature in the world ever did a more unrighteous or unholy act than to carry the resolution moved by Mr Whitehead on this (the sewage) question." Merciful goodness, how Frank Smith's cheeks must have colored had he been there to hear what his leader thought of the resolution which Mr Smith supported!

Mr Hubbard, who is doing time as Organizer for the Opposition, a position which promises to afford him a life-long job providing the salary hangs out, amuses himself sending out weighty articles to newspapers supporting the Opposition. Mr Hubbard is a most excellent fellow, personally, but as a political force we scarcely see where he qualifies. It will be a long time before he reaches the Agricultural department, at the present rate of progress.

Mr Flemming on Friday last, made what will probably be his last big speech in the House, for it is quite freely predicted locally and generally admitted in the country at large, that the senior member with his somewhat aggressive colleague Mr Smith, will be relegated to the also-rans. Mr Carvell and Mr McCain will scarcely be so long-winded, yet for all that, are in every way fitted to undertake a large part in the doings of the next Assembly.

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Despairing of electing their full ticket, the Opposition heeleders are to make a dead set to save Frank Smith's scalp. It is well-known that the young Florenceville politician is a special favorite of the Opposition leader, and in order to elect Smith, Flemming and Munro will be knifed in every conceivable fashion. Of course the Mayor's candidacy is not seriously regarded. Everyone admits him to be the weakest of the three in vote-getting ability, and such a thing as the election of the whole ticket is scarcely dreamed of even by the most enthusiastic Opposition workers, save perhaps some of the claqueurs who can see nothing but what appears through their own jaundiced orbs. It looks very much like any old trade to save Smith's bacon, but the bulk of the electors, who wish to place the county in line with a progressive government, are not going to throw away their votes, even to help out Mr Smith.

After a short illness David Kirkpatrick of Patterson Settlement, passed away on Saturday evening, 23rd inst, in the 91st year of his age. The deceased was one of the family of eight brothers who came from Donegal, Ireland, in the year 1829, being a mere boy of 13 years. He landed in St John with his widowed mother and five of the brothers. After a short rest they proceeded on their way and passed the first night near what is now known as Gaspeaux Lake. The two older brothers, James and Barnabas, having arrived two years before, as pioneers, were ready to welcome the new comers. The deceased after carving a home in the forest, in the year 1850 was united in marriage to Miss Ruth Gibson, daughter of Edward Gibson, of Quaco, Parson Desbrow officiating. His widow survives him. He was a member and classleader of the Methodist church, and his house was the preacher's home. Geo A and Edward Kirkpatrick of St John, Mrs John A Johnson of Bangor and Mrs I N Thorne of Whitneyville are the surviving children.
