Politics and Guesswork.

Just now the various politicians are selecting slates in anticipation of what Hon Clifford W Robinson is likely to do in connection with forming the new cabinet. That usually shrewd and well-informed authority, "Onlooker" in the St John New Freeman, seems to take it for granted, as do most people, that Hon Wendell F Jones is fairly certain to be the next Attorney-General, and that his appointment will be quite acceptable to the province at large. In this connection our St John friend mentions the rumor that Mr Walter H Trueman of that city, is in line for the position as Solicitor General. This would doubtless prove an excellent appointment, and generally satisfactory. We had the idea however, and have not fully given it up, that Mr Ora P King's friends favor his selection for the portfolio, but it may be that he will stand aside until after the federal elections, which may be looked for in a year or so, and then take the portfolio of Agriculture for which he is admirably qualified.

The Commissionship by that time is fairly certain to be vacant, as Hon L P Farris is generally looked upon as the one man who can take Mr Wilmot's measure in Sunbury and Queens. The genial commissioner is, moreover, not unwilling to make a try for his honored parent's seat in the Commons, his father the late John Farris having been in his lifetime M P for Queens from 1867 down to the time when the present Senator King went into federal politics. At any rate we believe Hon Mr Farris will be the next Liberal candidate in Sunbury and Queens.

This leads to another interesting conjecture. Provincial premiers are eagerly sought in the federal field. What is more likely than in the course of a very few years we shall find Hon C W Robinson a candidate for the Commons? In the event of Hon Mr Jones now being made Attorney General he would stand as an undoubted successor in the leadership. Carleton County may thus within a brief space of time give a premier to the province. Far more unlikely things have happened.

As for the local election, no one seems willing to hazard a guess regarding the date: Of course it is well ever to be watchful, as these occasions frequently come like the proverbial thief in the night. No one may truthfully say the Opposition will be caught napping, for in Carleton County as in most others, under Organizer Hubbard's direction, preliminary organization work such as looking after the lists etc, has been quietly but steadily going on for months. Locally a marked feeling of confidence pervades the government ranks, quite in contrast to the dismal prospect in the last local contest. The Mayor and his colleagues from up river are said to be cheery, and calmly awaiting the outcome. When the tug of war comes it will doubtless be interesting. Carvell, Jones and McCain are certainly names to reckon with in Carleton. No sane person questions the strength of the government ticket. The Opposition trio, to give them their due, are worthy foemen, but the odds are certainly against them. Carleton County now has a member of the Executive, a friend at Court. The Opposition will not deny that they can scarcely hope to seize the reins of power. In these circumstances what folly 't would be to turn down the government ticket.

The Book of Psalms.

The book of Psalms was the Hebrew hymn book. These Psalms were set to music and played and sung by the Jews in their worship. The book of Psalms was divided into five sections or books, ending with Psalms 41, 72, 89, 106 and 150. Each section or book closes with a doxology, except that with the last the entire concluding Psalm is a doxology for the section or book and also for the whole collection of Psalms. These different sections or books were without doubt composed at different times and added to this hymn-book of the Hebrews until it came, perhaps in the time of Ezra and Nehemiah, to be the magnificent volume of inspired Psalms for all God's people as we have it. As the old familiar Hymn-Book was called "Watts and Select," so the book of Psalms with equal propriety could be called David and Select.

All the Psalms in the first section or book are attributed to David, as well as many in the other sections or books. It is supposed that Solomon collected and arranged the Psalms in the first section or book about the year B C 1000. It would be but natural for Solomon to collect and arrange the Psalms of his father in a permanent form.

The second and third sections or books of the Psalms were collected and arranged by Hezekiah B C 700. The fourth and fifth sections or books were collected and arranged by Ezra and Nehemiah about P C 500.

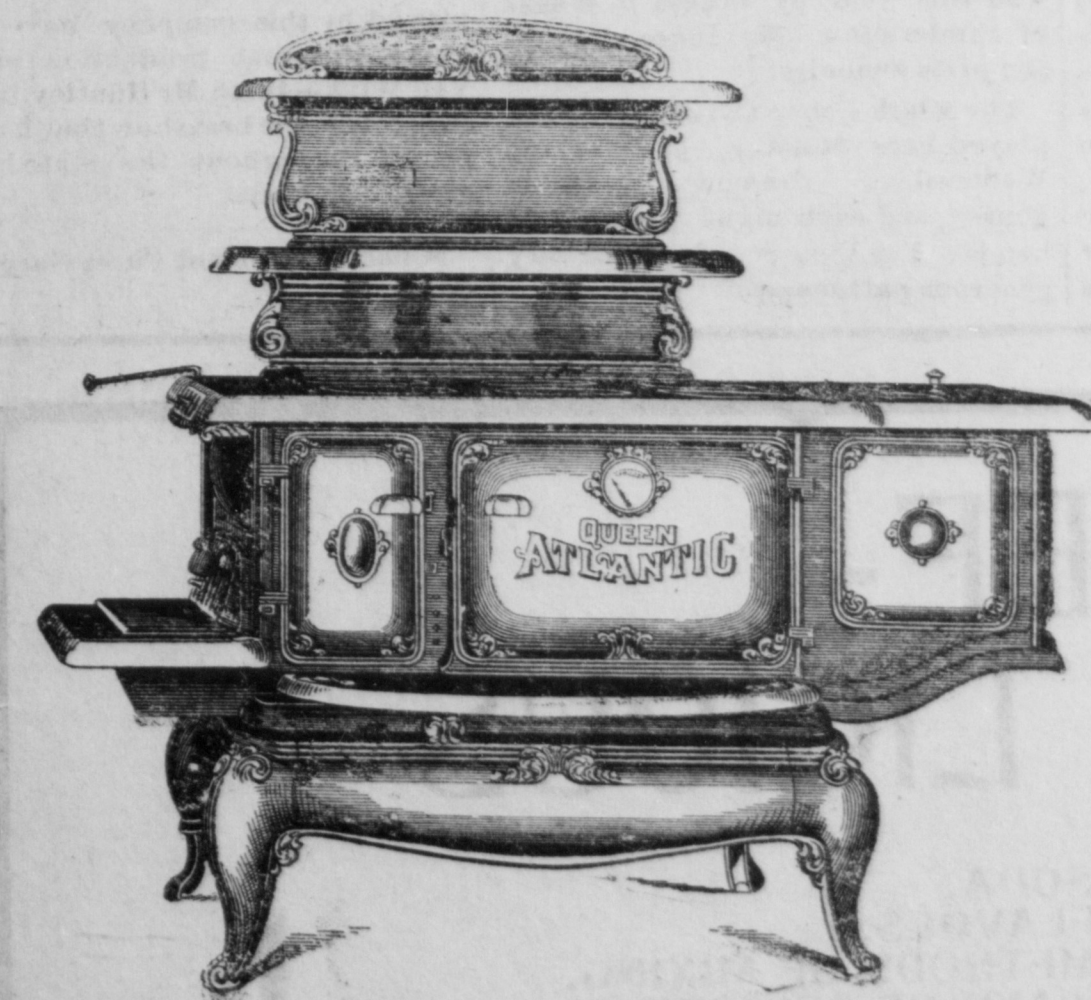
