A Big Transfer.

Wednesday morning Hon H A Connell sold to parties representing The Woodstock Electric Railway Light & Power Co, his Electric Light Station, his saw and grist mill, and his entire interest in the Davis mill site. These same gentlemen, on behalf of the Power Co, also purchased almost the entire stock issue of The Woodstock Electric Light Co. For the present the two plants will be operated as usual. Later on the Connell station will likely be dismantled.

Very Important Announcement.

We have learned on undoubted authority that Engineer Stewart and Legal Representative Ruel of McKenzie & Mann's initial survey have been so impressed with the Valley of the St John as a suitable railway location that they will recommend the firm to at once go ahead with the building of a road from Centreville to St John, by way of Lakeville, Woodstock, and Fredericton, following the right bank of the river. Centreville will thus be the terminus of the new railway until the line is extended through to Quebec. This is splendid news for the entire county, and will be exceptionally welcome in the district to be served by the Valley Line.

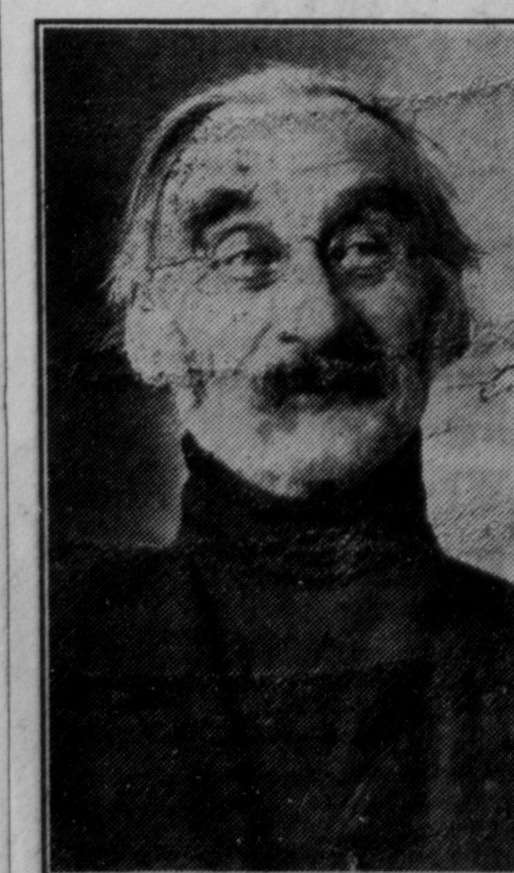
