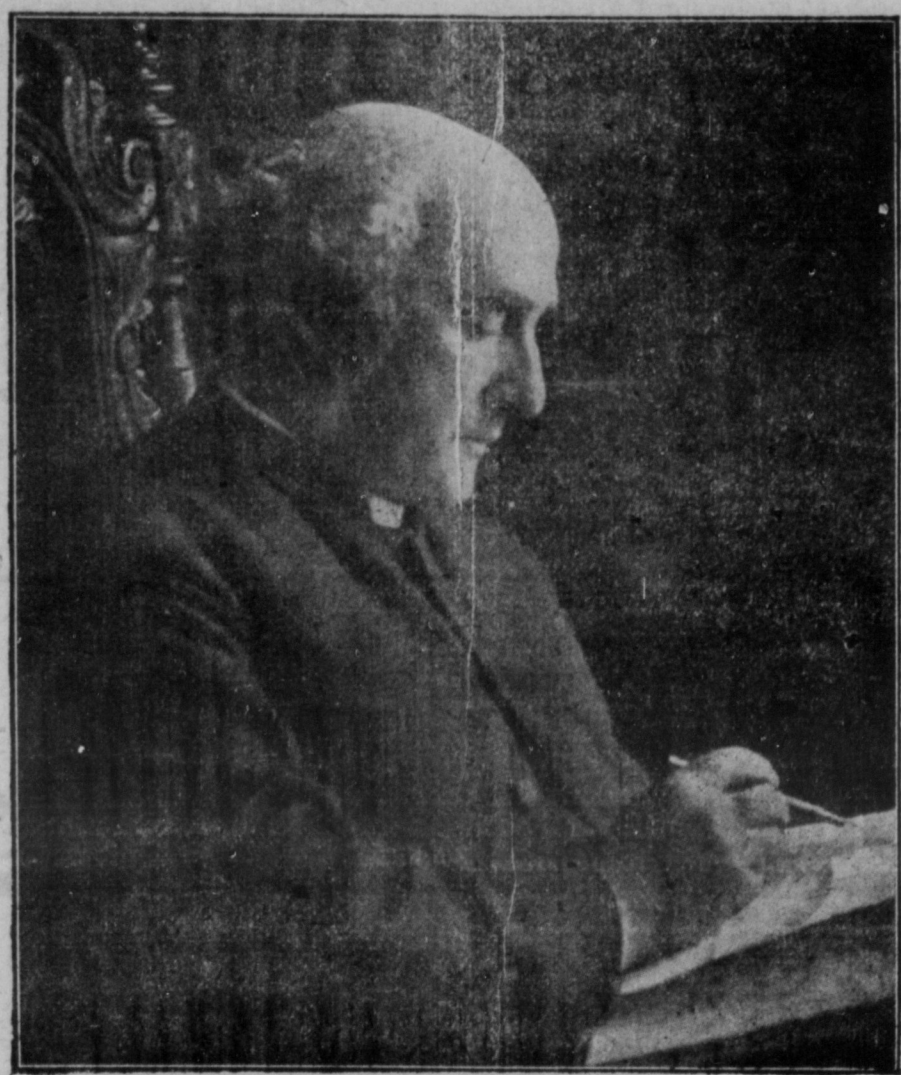

Baptist Union

Another prominent member of the Reformed Baptist Church, Ald H G Noble, the well-known chairman of the Finance Committee of the Woodstock Council and proprietor of the Corner grocery, expresses himself in favor of church union on broad lines. Speaking to a reporter the other day Ald Noble said "I am in favor of Union, and believe it could be arranged on terms satisfactory to both Reformed and United Baptists. I would be glad to see committees get together to endeavor to find a common doctrinal basis."
