Hartland Letter.

Editor Sentinel,

SIR:—My letter of the 3-d inst, which appeared in the "SENTINEL" of 6th inst called forth severe criticism by the "Dispatch" correspondent the following week, but with all he said in support of his client, Mr Barneto, he failed to contradict beyond his own assertion or in any way prove that there was anything untrue in any statement I made. His sole object was to bolster up the postmaster and defend his reputation, and assume his knowledge of the author of my letter, and in which he is most fearfully astray,—to cast insinuations and make false impressions. Why don't they refute the statements contained in my letter and never mind who is the author, surmises, suspicions, insinuations and motives amount to nothing.
