Island Park Opening.

Tuesday afternoon Island Park, the new pleasure ground at the head of Rogers' Island, was the scene of the first big battle in the local league. The Cubs were stacked up against the Broadways, and after a fierce struggle, tanned the Wellington Ward boys to the tune of 16 to 6. The 67th Regt Band was in attendance, and there were about two hundred present when Umpire Sullivan and Mayor Munro strode on the diamond. Play ball hoarsely called out the Umpire. Don Payson for the South Siders grasped the wagon tongue and faced His Worship. With a majestic sweep the chief magistrate heaved the first ball over the plate, as true as might be done by a Matthewson. The astonished batter missed it a mile, and heaved a huge sigh of relief as His Worship stepped out of the box and gave way to Gillis. In the first inning Payson scored, and there was nothing doing on the part of the Cubs. Mr Payson duplicated his performance in the second spasm, and the Cubs fared ill as usual. Neither side shone in the third. In the fourth the Broadways got onto Gillis and pounded out three runs. Charlie Jones started the fireworks for the Cubs, and after some nice pilfering, safely crossed the plate. The other team got one in the fifth spasm. An unfortunate accident at the commencement of the Cubs' half sent Gillis to the bench. He was at the bat and struck a foul tip which grazed his eyebrow, making a cut nearly two inches long. Joe Bradley went on in his stead, and got first on a safe hit. The Cubs took on new life and before the inning closed ran in five tallies, and henceforth were never headed. Roy McLauchlan went in the box and had the Broadways completely at his mercy. In the remainder of the game they failed to score. The Cubs got one in the sixth, and were blanked in the seventh, but in the eighth pounded Dusky Demon Jones all over the lot. Everybody came to bat, and most everybody scored. The fault was not so much with Jones as with his fielders, who in spots were very ragged. Nine runs came in before the balloon came down.

If the totally unexpected were to happen, and Mr Hazen should be called upon to form a government, what would he do? Certainly a majority of the gentlemen will not have seats in the next Assembly, to say nothing of their chance of adorning the seats of the mighty.

McLean and Borden.

We have frequently called attention to the fact that Mr Borden is not entirely acceptable to his followers. The Toronto World, edited by Wm F McLean, a conservative M P, has this slap at the leader:—The people of Canada have been very much concerned of late about the dealings between parties and understandings and negotiations and agreements and private interviews or private negotiations in regard to quite a number of things. The leader of the opposition has allowed himself to be erected into a kind of cabinet minister under the special patronage of the prime minister for the time being, and the only opposition recognized in the house is the opposition that the government chooses to so recognize and with which it is in negotiation more or less of the time!

We do not know that there is any question more worthy of discussion at the present moment than the new condition of affairs gradually growing up in this country, and resulting in the recognition by the government of an official opposition whose leader is under salary from the government and is more or less in open or secret negotiation with the government that happens to be in power for the day.

New School Trustee.

At a meeting of the Town Council held Monday night, J T Allan Dibblee, President of the Board of Trade, was elected a School Trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the removal from town of W B Nicholson. Mr Dibblee is a prominent business man and should prove a worthy member of the School Board.

Rev Dr W C Keirstead delivered a lecture in the Main St Church Monday night on Gladstone. The subject was handled in masterly fashion. There was some good music in connection. A large audience was present.

Tremendous plunges have been made in speculative investments in Canada the past few years. The banks have begun to "shorten sail" by curtailing credit and increasing their rates on renewals.

Most of the speculation, of late, has been in the Cobalt region, and in Western lands. These speculations continue, but the closing down by the banks upon investments of the "tenderfoot" character may check the propensities of the public to invest their earnings in those air-bubbles.

The action of the banks is significant. The statement for April reflects the progress Canada is making, and at the same time the precaution the banks are taking against possible troubles.

The notes in circulation in April, 1907, were \$72,842,909 against \$76,346,013 in March, and \$66,539,677 in April, 1906.

The deposits payable on demand increased by over ten million dollars in the year the figures being:

April, 1907, \$167,217,947
March, 1907, 163,637,868
April, 1906, 157,147,012
The deposits payable after notice also show a substantial increase. In April, 1906, they totalled \$378,379,049, in March, 1907, \$404,289,184, and in April, 1906, \$407,370,491.

Domestic note circulation increased by nearly \$3,000,000 in the month, and by nearly \$9,000,000 in the year, the figures being:

March, 1907, 42,631,694

Call loans on stocks in Canada are over \$5,000,000 less than in April, 1906, when they totalled \$55,295,613. In April, 1907, they amounted to \$50,357,266, against \$51,676,592 in March. Call loans elsewhere also show a decline. In April, 1906, they were \$51,742,814; in March, 1907, \$51,340,792, but in April, 1907, had been reduced to \$48,430,477.

Current loans in Canada have increased by nearly one hundred millions in the year. In April last they totalled \$586,149,738, against \$579,057,554 in March, and \$486,683,324 in April, 1906. Current loans elsewhere, on the other hand, show a decline from \$35,578,158 in April, 1906, to \$38,305,188 in March, 1907, and \$28,933,174 in April, 1907.

The total assets of the Canadian banks in April were valued at \$951,063,557, against liabilities of \$773,904,327. The comparative figures are:

March, 1907, assets, \$943,695,386; liabilities, \$765,737,503; April, 1906, assets, \$843,599,867; liabilities, \$681,700,156.

Dispensary Crookedness.

The abolition of the dispensary in South Carolina has been an occasion of revealing some of the crookedness which characterized some of the conduct of the State liquor shops.

An investigation has been made and it has been found that the stock in the State dispensary was limited by law \$400,000, yet the directors had on hand \$750,000 worth of liquor. In the sub-dispensaries it was also ascertained that in the preceeding six weeks the purchases amounted to \$500,000. Much of this was bought in violation of the law which provided that bids be submitted and that orders be given without the directors knowing the names of the bidders. It was further shown that one director visited distilleries in Illinois and made a purchase, without bids, of \$125,000. An expert estimated that the State was over charged from \$25,000 to \$28,000 on this one deal.

It seems to be conceded that through the system of permitting dealers to over charge for liquor and its being pocketed by the dispensary officials in the forms of rebates, the State may have lost about \$300,000 a year for 10 years.

It was shown that \$38,000 was paid for one order for labels for whiskey bottles when several substantial establishments offered to duplicate the order for less than \$10,000.

State control has proved to be an utter failure in South Carolina.
