### The Session of Parliament.

The third session of the tenth Parliament of Canada began on Thursday, November 22, and has thus continued for 157 days including holidays and the two adjournments for Christmas and Easter—just about 100 actual working days.

The session falls naturally into three divisions:—the period previous to the Christmas vacation, which was chiefly characterized by the efforts of the Conservatives to lay the foundations of their proposed campaign of "graft" charges; the period from the vacation to the departure of the Premier and two ministers for London, which was a time of extremely bitter, allusive and personal debate in the course of which the tone of parliament reached an unprecedented low-water-mark, and culminating in the acutely personal but entirely decorous debate on the Insurance Report shortly after the Ministers' departure; and finally from the ministerial hegira and the Insurance debate until the finish.

In view of the circumstances of the session, there is more ground for surprise that the important legislation effected was so much rather than that it was so little. Even if the Lemieux Conciliation Act were the only novel legislation, it would be sufficient to give any session an honorable place in history. The readjustment of the Provincial subsidies is also a step of the utmost importance, though it happens to be the result of a conference of Premiers rather than of any actual deliberation by the House of Commons or Senator. Similarly the readjustment of the country's tariff system through an operation of the first magnitude which was nominally performed by this Parliament, was really the result of previous consideration and of the labors of the Tariff Commission, and was effected in the House with scarcely a ripple on the placid waters of the debate. Little of the other legislation of the session can be regarded as involving any novel or important principles.

The Government met Parliament with one of its ministers disabled and away from the country—Hon Mr Hyman of the Public Works portfolio. That department was throughout the session conducted in the House with great success by Hon Mr Fisher, in addition to his own Department of Agriculture. On March 28, as a consequence of alleged libelous charges in three Canadian papers, Hon Mr Emmerson gave up the portfolio of Railways, temporarily held since then by the Minister of Finance. And a few days later, the Premier and the Ministers of Militia and Marine sailed for England for the Colonial Conference, and some considerable part of the departmental work in Parliament of the two latter was left in the hands of the depleted Cabinet at home. Since the beginning of the month, therefore, the House of Commons has been deprived of the assistance

of no less than five of the Cabinet Ministers. That the intellectual predominance, to say nothing of the numerical, of the Liberal party has never been in any way impaired during this period is an indication of the remarkably unbalanced condition of affairs as between the parties.

Moreover the Government has had throughout to contend with the opposition of one of the brightest minds on the Liberal side of the House, for Mr Bourassa, with his two followers, while not co-operating in any way with Mr Borden's party has taken no interest in any questions except those on which he felt impelled to criticise the administration.

There has been a similar free critic on the Opposition side, in the person of Mr W F Maclean, who has pursued his own way quite regardless of the interests of the organized Conservative party, but has been conspicuous by his criticism of both parties on the questions in which he is specially interested.

On the other hand, in militia matters, the chief field in which he claims to be an authority, Col Sam Hughes has broken from his party (on the plea that the militia must be out of politics) and has supported the Government. For the rest, the party division has been straight and continuous, the fact that a large portion of the Conservative press is very critical of four or five prominent members of the party having made no visible difference to their relations in the House.

The House assembled towards the end of November under the shadow of two events of the past vacation—the Insurance Commission's hearings and the Toronto investigation of the London election. The latter was at once removed from the arena by the effort, unsuccessful for a time, of the member for London, Hon Mr Hyman, to resign his seat. Future allusions were confined to insinuations of other reasons for Mr Hyman's retirement. No such prohibition was set on the topic of the Insurance Report. The evidence taken before that Commission was public property, and there was a strong feeling current that it impaired not only the public character but the Parliamentary freedom of several Conservative members. Conservatives were sensitive and irritable at every allusion, however vague, to the revelations there made; while Liberals were anxious to press their advantage, and in their impatience frequently overlooked the fact that the report and evidence were not formally before the House. The situation, however, did not become strained until after Christmas.

The Conservatives got to work at the very beginning on a line of operations that looked very much like a resumption of the "scandal session" of last year. But their success was even less encouraging. Mr Ames put in demands for copies of papers relating to the Galway Horse and Cattle Co., the Grand Forks Cattle Co., the Milk River Cattle Co., the Roblin's Irrigation Co., and the Saskatchewan Valley Land Co., in the second week of the session, and the actions of the Interior Department in regard to these various interests in Alberta and Saskatchewan were pursued to the uttermost, with most unsatisfactory results. All these were cases of people who had made large profits by the rapid rise in

value of certain lands, a fact which in itself seemed to be regarded as suspicious, if not criminal, by the Conservative investigators. The secrecy of the North Atlantic Trading Company was again raised, and was animadverted on at length at various times until an advanced stage of the session. The Ross rifle was the subject of an energetic attack, Col Hughes joining; the Government in its defence.

Beginning at this time also the Conservatives became extremely busy on the Public Accounts Committee. The results of their labors came to light later in the session. Routine proceedings were varied by the frequent plains of the Prince Edward Island Conservatives as to communications, representation, telegraphs, subsidies and every other conceivable grievance, which, became more and more acute as the winter progressed.

The month of January, in spite of the amount of recommitment that began to be noticeable saw a good deal of legislation of some importance put through the difficult stages. For instance, there was the Canned Foods Inspection Bill of Mr Fisher, the Electric Power Export Bill of Mr Aylesworth, and some bills correcting anomalies in the constitutional arrangements made two sessions ago for the West. Immigration began to loom up as a subject of interest.

In February the Opposition, and particularly Mr Foster, began to develop their attempted parry of the blow inflicted by the Insurance Commission was inspired for partisan purposes by Hon Mr Aylesworth. The absence of writing instructions was used as an argument to show that there must have been partisan verbal instructions. Allegations of the existence of a lumber combine in British Columbia led to the appointment of a special committee, which later elicited much striking information. The Conciliation Bill had considerable trouble in committee owing to the attitude of the railroad employees. On Feb 14, Mr Fowler made his famous "Women, Wine and Graft" speech, and in the consequent reaction personalities more or less completely disappeared from the debates. Much time was lost in the debates on this extraordinary utterance later in the session, almost up to Sir Wilfrid's departure, but on various technical grounds Mr Fowler was left in peace without being called on to withdraw or substantiate his insinuation against unnamed Ministerialists.

The alleged scandals or the Conservatives now began to appear in the House in the shape of amendments to the motion to go into supply. The Galway Cattle Co was the first. Mr Herron started up the Blairmore townsie question, perhaps the most incomprehensible of all the obscure scandals raised by the Conservative party. Towards the end of March Mr Emmerson made an unusually effective and businesslike I C R budget speech, and a few days later, after the brief Easter recess, tendered his resignation, with his estimates only partly through. The debate on the railway budget was startlingly void of effective criticism.

The three Ministers left on April 2, after a few days of the utmost uncertainty whether the position of public business would permit Sir Wilfrid to quit the country. Subsequent events have shown that his presence at the very earliest meetings of the Conference was indispensable for the securing of the Canadian conception of Imperial relations. The proceedings of the House since his departure, however, have been somewhat drab. The voting of supply has proceeded with very little incident, preceded on a good many occasions by an amendment embodying some alleged scandal, no one of the half-dozen examples of which has succeeded in taking hold of the public mind.

The picturesque features of the month were the debate precipitated by Mr Foster on the Insurance Report (in which he was crushingly censured by Mr Aylesworth and was supported on division by only seven-teen of the Conservative following); the debate on immigration in which Mr Bourassa developed his fear of Western development as a menace to French-Canadian influence; the obstructive debate on the Hamilton Radial Bill; and finally the spectacular overthrow of the Opposition in the matter of the charge of invasion of Provincial Rights in the occupation of Petawawa for camp purposes. The last hours of the session were prolonged by the difficulties of a very unusual piece of business, the adoption of a resolution petitioning the British Crown for an amendment of the BNA Act increasing the provincial subsidies, which again called out a strenuous protest from Mr Bourassa against what he described as special favors to the West.
