Kirkland.

The roads are quite muddy in some places. It looks like rain.

Mrs J W Crawford and Mrs David Dykeman made a very pleasant call at the home of Mrs J W Nicholson, yesterday.

The dwelling house of J Fred Saunders of Monument Sett. was burned about seven o'clock in the evening of April 22nd. The building was two story hip roof with ell, woodshed, granary and hog house attached, about one hundred and fifty bushels of oats, a pig ready for killing for meat, a sleigh, potatoes in the cellar, all his clothing with exception of what he had on, his nephew's clothes and a sum of money beside all the contents of his ell part in fact almost all his household effects were consumed. The house was all finished and well furnished. At the lowest estimate his loss is \$1700 00. He had a small insurance.

Robert Ivey was living on what is known as the Tyrell farm, Eel River Lake. The house was burned in the morning of April 22nd. He lost all his household effects. Mr Ivey has a family of eight small children to care for.

J Leslie Kennedy is building a storehouse for all his farm machinery.

J Fred Saunders went to Woodstock on a business trip to-day.

John Ivey of Bear Trap Point, Eel River Lake, died April 23rd of paralysis, aged 61 years. He was a member of the Episcopal Church, and is survived by his wife who was Fanny McIntyre of what is now known as Maxwell Sett., one son Andrew and one daughter, Mrs Chas Sullivan of Houlton, Me. a number of grand children, six brothers, Geo. James, Joseph, Thomas, Robert and Charles and other relatives. Rev A W Teed attended the services at the house and grave. The remains were carried about 8 miles to the cemetery in Kirkland. About fourteen teams followed in procession.

George McIntyre was in Woodstock on a business trip recently.

The remains of Frank Bull the young man who was lost the first part of the winter were found Sunday morning in Dead Creek near the bridge. It will be remembered that he started to visit his sister, Mrs Varney of Eel River Lake taking his skates along. Mr and Mrs Fred Bull the parents of deceased passed through here this morning on their way to Hartin Sett.

Southampton, April 27.—The American line steamship St Paul, which left Southampton on her regular voyage bound for New York Saturday afternoon, in a dense snowstorm, rammed and destroyed the British second-class cruiser Gladiator off the Isle of Wight. The first reports stated that from twenty to thirty of the Gladiator's crew had been drowned, but later intelligence reduces the number of casualties greatly.

No one on the St Paul was killed or injured, but the bodies of Stewart Wigdery, Writer Cowdery and a Maltese steward, named Die Bras, all attached to the cruiser, have been brought ashore, one officer, Lieutenant Wm P Graces, an Irishman, who attempted to swim to land, is missing, and eight injured have been taken to the military hospital at Golden Hill for treatment. It is believed that only a few others are unaccounted for.

The St Paul left Southampton at 12.30 o'clock. She was an hour behind her usual time of sailing, the delay being due to the belated arrival of the passenger train, which was blocked by snowdrifts in the trip from London. The weather was comparatively clear in Southampton waters, but immediately the St Paul turned into the Solent, which runs parallel to the Isle of Wight, she encountered a terrific snowstorm. Captain Passow, and his chief officer with the American line's regular pilot, were on the bridge, and a lookout man was posted in the bows. Suddenly a ship appeared immediately in front of them. It was the Gladiator at anchor. Orders were given on the instant for full speed astern, in an endeavor to clear the cruiser, but it was too late.

The St Paul's sharp stem rammed the anchored vessel amidships; she quivered and reeled and the passengers rushed on deck in great alarm, the women on the verge of a panic. The officers and crew acted with the greatest coolness and allayed the terror, with as fine a display of discipline as though she were the best-trained man-of-war. Five lifeboats were lowered within a few minutes, to rescue the crew of the Gladiator which had sustained a death blow.

The cruisers began to sink almost at once. Her men gave a magnificent demonstration of discipline. At the captain's command they formed in line on the deck and stood in ranks while the cruiser settled down. In obedience to orders successive batches marched to the gangways and entered the St Paul's boats, until practically the whole crew had been taken off and landed at Yarmouth, on the Isle of Wight.

The Gladiator's crew numbered 450 men, and Captain Walter Lumsden, true to naval traditions, was the last to leave his ship. Only a few men were missing, and it was thought that most of them had been saved by a boat which had put out from Yarmouth. Captain Lumsden, on landing, at once sent a message to Captain Passow, thanking him for his promptitude in lowering boats, and speaking in the most complimentary terms of the conduct of the St Paul's seamen.
