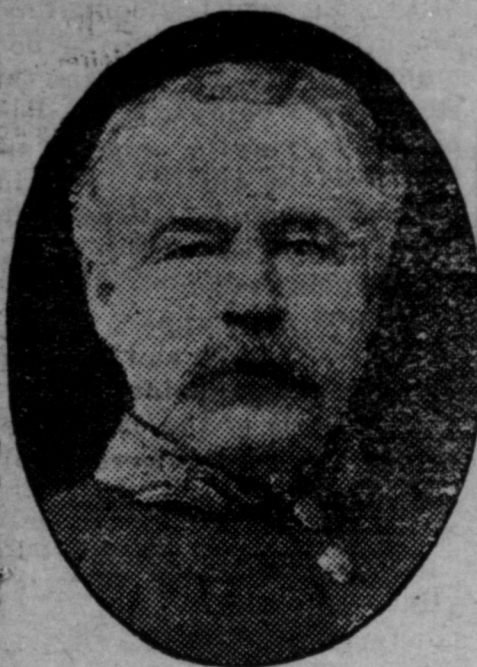

The Convention.

The action of the Convention on Saturday last in nominating Mr. George W. Upham for the Assembly is one that will be heartily approved throughout the County. 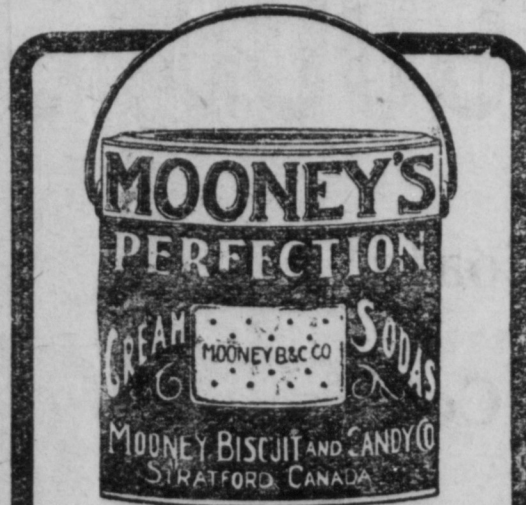
