Church Union in Canada.

The movement in the direction of organic church union has been advanced a most important stage. The joint committee representing the Methodist, the Presbyterian, and the Congregational Churches in Canada, which closed its fifth annual conference at midnight last night, has accomplished a work which in its significance as regards organic church union, is not equalled by anything recorded in church history since the Reformation. Such, indeed, was the deliberate statement made by so exact a scholar as Principal Patrick Winnipeg. To that assertion assent was given by the theologians and ministers and men of affairs who have been considering the vital matters of doctrine, of polity, and of tradition involved in their careful and exhaustive deliberations over the union of those three great religious denominations. If one looks back to the problem of church union as it stood four years ago, when this movement first took purposeful shape in Canada, one cannot but marvel at what has been done. The resolution drawn by Principal Gordon of Queen's University, Kingston, and seconded by two laymen, representative of the other negotiating Churches, reviewing the results of these years of investigation and conference, would not have been deemed possible in the premises four years ago. Last night it was adopted with the utmost unanimity. The harmony of their essential doctrines, as disclosed in frequent and frank discussions, was almost a surprise to the leaders in the different Churches, and notwithstanding the differences of genius and history no obstacle was discovered to their organic union.

It may be years before the union of those denominations will be an accomplished fact, but this is certain that a step has been taken which never can be retraced. Those three Churches have come together in conference to close and too vital for them ever again to be strangers. The logic of their very life will bind them in a unity of faith and a co-operation of service which will one day not as far off as some suppose, make their separate ecclesiastical existence impossible. It looks as though Canada, which led the way in the reunion of the various branches of Presbyterianism and of Methodism, will lead the way in this larger and more significant reunion of Christian forces in the world. Such a distinction would be worth while.

Editorial Comment in the Chatham World.

Staunch Conservative Paper Flays Hazen et al.

The Stumpage Shortage.

An Chatham correspondent of the St. John Telegraph wires to his paper:

"It was reported to day that the J. B. Snowball Company was to enter action for libel against the Fredericton Gleaner. The grounds of the action rest on an editorial which appeared in Wednesday's issue of the Fredericton newspaper dealing with the payment of stumpage by Snowball concern. The article inspired by attacks made by Mr. Maxwell in Carleton county, accused the company of making false returns involving an amount of \$9,000. W. B. Snowball, president of the company, left town this morning and will not be back for several days and your correspondent was unable to learn just what line of action had been decided upon."

The Gleaner is quite prepared to defend any such action as the Snowball Company apparently threatens in the above, and challenges them to proceed without delay.—Gleaner

There is no question at all of the truth of the charge that the returns failed to account for the larger portion of the cut, and that investigation resulted in the discovery of that fact, but the Gleaner has made the merchant, instead of the operator and the dealer, responsible for the incorrect returns.

The correct returns, if we understand the matter correctly, were not made and sworn to by Mr. Snowball, as might be inferred from the Gleaner. Nor did the Snowball Co. have to pay the additional stumpage. The men who had the contracts to haul the logs had to pay the stumpage, and the \$9000 additional that was collected came out of their pockets.

When the government started in, the second time, to find out the facts of this matter, Mr. Snowball gave the Surveyor General the returns of the Snowball surveyors, which, of course, greatly simplified the work of the officers. We gather from the report of a speech or interview of his that appeared in the Moncton Transcript, some days ago, that he was disgusted to learn that the Government, after getting those surveyors' returns from him, did not treat all the operators alike, but collected stumpage on only fifty per cent of the logs that were hauled by a man who promised that he and his three sons would vote right, and full stumpage from the others.

This should be inquired into. The opposition ought to have it investigated. If Government supporters are to pay half stumpage, everybody ought to know it. The evident disposition of the lumberers to nominate or support a straight opposition candidate indicates that they have sized up the situation in this way.

We suggest to the Gleaner to make some further inquiries to see if it has not done Mr. Snowball an injustice in its method of publishing the facts in reference to the discovery of the false returns that were sent in from this county. It should guard against injustice to an individual while demanding justice for the people. Some one sent in false returns, but the Gleaner, while condemning the act, should not put the blame on the wrong person.

We note that the Chief Commissioner is posing as 'the representative in the Government of the Irish Catholics.' Fully four-fifths of the Irish Catholics of Northumberland are strongly opposed to Northumberland deal No One and Northumberland deal No Two, and voted against the candidate of the dealers by a large majority. They are astounded of the course that has been pursued by the man who claims to represent them.

The statement, freely expressed by Liberal newspapers and recently attributed to Mr. Burchill, that the result of the by-elections is 'a protest against the Hazen Government's taking part in the Dominion elections,' does not apply to this county, because it took no open part in the Northumberland federal contest, and threw its influence quietly in favor of the Liberal candidate.

The Great Exponent of Coalition Party Principles

Turning his back on the nominee of a convention composed of Government supporters, both Liberals and Conservatives, and supporting the nominee of the Liberal Opposition convention, is what the Honorable John calls carrying out coalition principles! Does he know what the Word means? He seems to think that the coalition party of the Co. was composed of supporters and

opponents of the Government! What a hopeless muddle the man's alleged mind must be in Combines or coalitions of supporters and opponents of any Government are never formed except for carrying through some scheme of public plunder. It was, of course, a coalition of Liberals and Conservatives who supported the present Local Government and condemned the late Robinson Government. He calls his desertion to the Liberal Opposition camp the carrying out a coalition such as this! And the St. John editors howl with derision in their offices, and then write seriocomic articles endorsing his views as sound and statesmanlike. Some friend of his ought to induce him to stop talking for publication.

A Laughingstock for Canada.

If the Conservative supporters of the Government and its Liberal supporters had held separate conventions and nominated different candidates, the Government would have been free to choose between them, but they united in the choice of one candidate, and the Opposition contention put up a candidate against him. Then the Government (led by the Chief Commissioner) supported the candidate of its opponents! And the great Newcastle exponent of constitutional law calls this the carrying out of the coalition principle! The Local Government is at present a laughingstock for all Canada and its leader a target for the derision of the Dominion. He may not be contributing to 'the gaiety of nations' as Dr. Johnston said of David Garrick, but his submission to his subordinate is the mirth of provinces.

Gen Washington and Gen Hazen.

The unsolved mystery is, not why its representative betrayed it and its supporters, but why the Premier did not swoop down upon the salesman and prevent the delivery of the goods. Gen Washington, when he learned that Benedict Arnold was negotiating with the enemy for the surrender of the fortress he commanded, swooped down upon him instantly, thereby saving the fortress even if he failed to catch the traitor. But Gen Hazen stood back, with folded hands, and allowed his Northumberland fortress to be delivered up to the enemy.

The Opposition candidate, Mr. Upham, was elected in Carleton by 98 majority. The fact that the Government, as if afraid of defeat, had turned its back on a supporter in this county and was supporting the Opposition convention's nominee, was sufficient to defeat it in Carleton. They love fighting men in Carleton, and have no use for cowards and traitors.

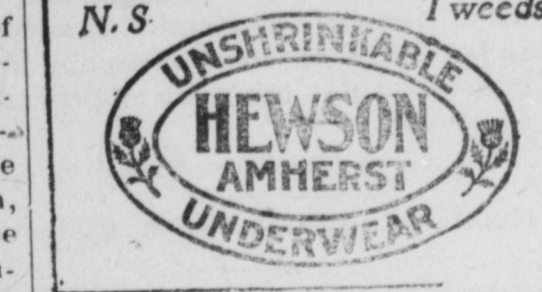
