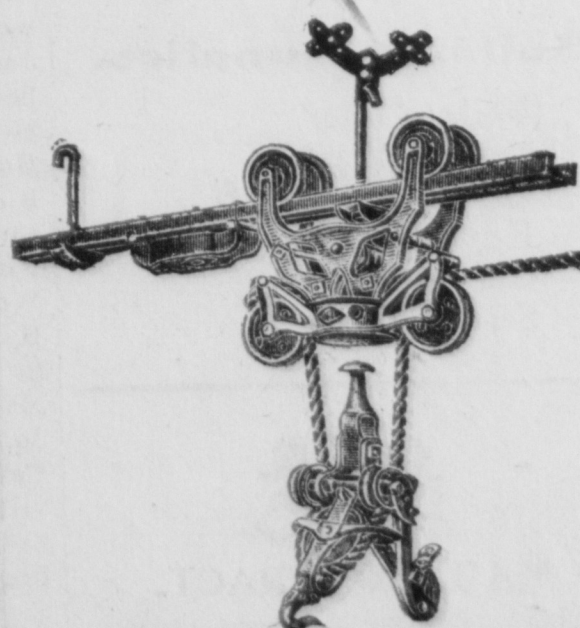

The Diamond Steel Track Unloader.

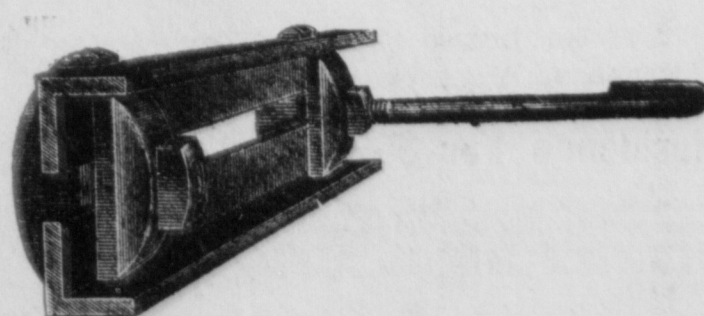

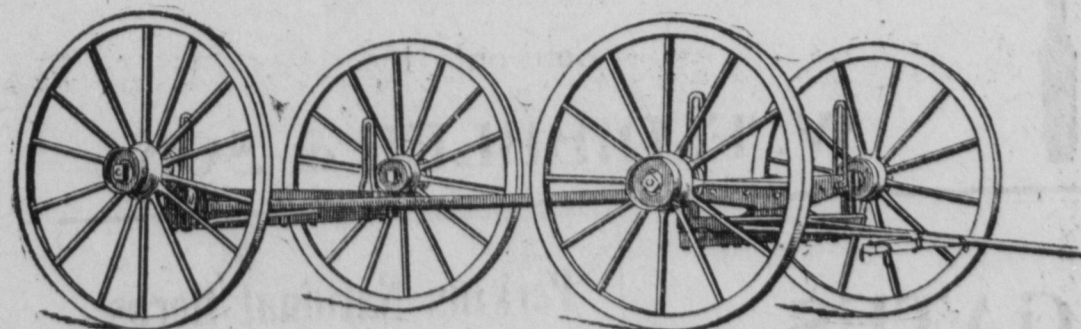
