#### Down The Valley.

The Grand Trunk Pacific is bound to reach St John in order to get the nearest Canadian outlet for its freight traffic. It was at one time seriously considered that the most economical way to reach St John from the main line was by utilizing the Central Ra lway, but apparently that idea has been abandoned. The railway subsidies just brought down at Ottawa provide a graut of \$6,400 per mile from St John to Westfield, Gagetown to Fredericton, and Centreville to Grand Fails, thus filling all the gaps between the Falls and St John. Last year the ether loups ! were voted, and it would seem that the Transcontinental authorities are seriously considering the Valley to Mr Crocket's line of questioning, Route as the most feasible in getting to tidewater. We are confident that a line from Grand Fails to St John along the valley will prove to be a money maker, and we sincerely hope that the Commission will decide in favor of utilizing the route.

Rumor has it that Northumberlan' Kent and Charlotte will be the scene of local by-elections after the federal contest. And there may be one or two others.

Pretty soon every Tory voter in the province will be designated by the title J P unless the local govern ment can devise some other means of rewarding the faithful.
