Principal Richards and Mr R E Estabrooks continue at the College, and Principal Draper at Broadway, their contracts not having been terminated. The new teachers, the Misses Long, Raymond, Fish, Boyd and Smith all come with excellent recommendations. One very unusual feature was the almost entire absence of candidates for the Grammar

School position, not a single male teacher having applied, and only one or two females outside of Miss Neales.

Owing to the fact that the building used as quarters for the Sloyd School will be needed for Principal Draper's School, and the lack of applicants for the position as Sloyd teacher, the Board voted to discontinue the Sloyd department for a year. The trustees have several rooms in view as suitable for temporary use while the new Broadway building is under construction, and they hope to have satisfactory arrangements made within a few days.

Rooms in the Opera and in the new annex to the Lynch building are among those being considered.

Wesley DeLong has been given the contract for clearing away the debris at Broadway, and for the new building several architects are submitting plans for acceptance. It seems to be generally felt that a modern building will be put up, equipped with all the latest appliances, including a steam-heating apparatus.
