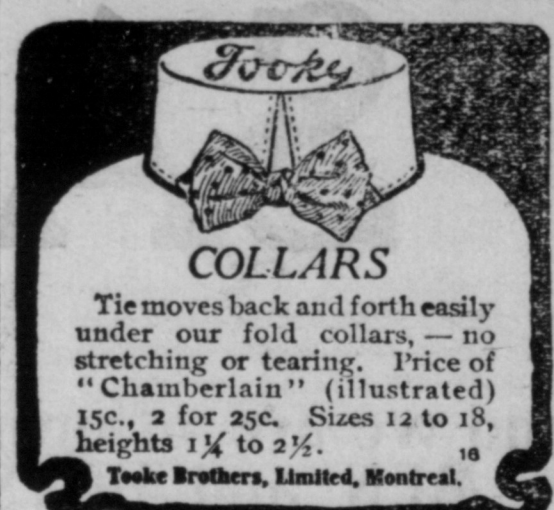

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.
(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

P. B. Conference.

The P. B. Conference just closed from its recent Session at Middle Simonds O. C. proved to be one of the most satisfactory Sessions for many years, from the beginning until the ending the whole of the Christian body of participants were permeated with the power and influence of the Holy Spirit. Preachers and people were possessed with such a fullness of spiritual strength and willingness to offer to the great leader of the church, such a double submission to his Divine will that nothing seemed to deter them from giving such living testimony to the goodness and mercy of God that the very atmosphere seemed to be filled with the voice of praise and thanksgiving to the Lamb that was slain to Redeem their lost and unsaved souls. There was no staying or cutting off by the ministry of this great volume of praise and testimony by the humble people of God but a chance was given to the whole and undisputed right of the ministers and people to raise their voices in praise and thanksgiving to their Saviour and redeemer; seldom did we ever witness in religious service such profound and Holy enthusiasm as was manifested in our 34 yearly meeting. The outlook and prospect of future growth and enlargement of our body. Our ministry are standing for the old faith and doctrine of the open door the free gifts of the church the scriptural right of all believers to public testimony and equal right, in the house of God in all religious services, neither ahead or behind the pastor or preacher but with full liberties to testify anywhere and everywhere to the grace and saving power of God, to help and keep them through to the end.

Later on we expect to give to our readers and churches a full and clear report of our annual meeting and its results we hope that in the near future we will again resume business again and then we will try and enlighten the minds of our people, with regard to our work, and keep in touch with the live and vital principle of the Doctrines of our body and what they are for and how to apply them to the good and profit of all ministers and people. There are controverted questions regarding some of the practices of the early christian experience that we will try soon to give some explanation as our body believe and endure them in connection with our treating of faith. 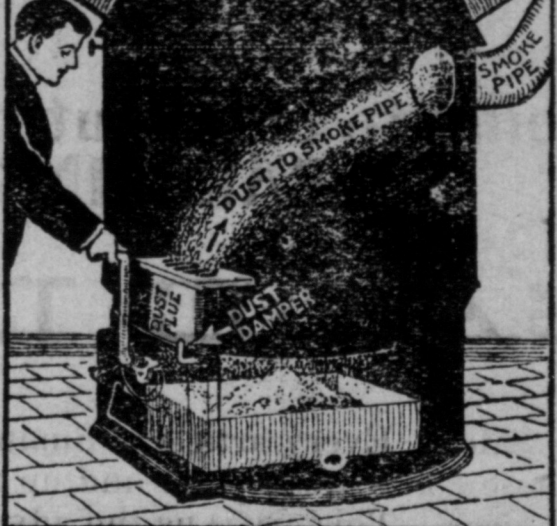

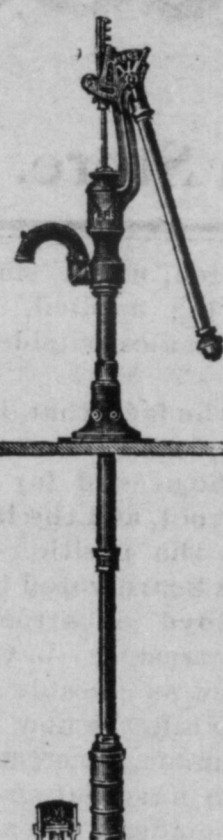
