Smith's Bridge Fake.

Mr Smith has started his bridge fake again, hoping that he may be able to work it as successfully as he did in the Local Election last March. It now transpires that he promised a bridge to the people of Clear View, also to Dr Wyman and others at Beechwood, and told his Conservative friends at Bath to keep quiet and allow him to fool the people of Upper Kent and Clear View and then they would get the bridge. He is now going one step further and is having a survey made for a bridge at Upper Kent. It does not take an Engineer to tell that it is possible to build a bridge across the St John River at that point but the best evidence of the insincerity of the whole game lies in the fact that on Saturday the twelfth instant Smith opened his campaign at Bath and extensively advertised that the meeting would be addressed by the Hon Mr Flemming and the Hon Mr McLeod. As soon as this became known the Conservatives of Bath and Wicklow got out and signed a long petition demanding that there be a declaration that the bridge would be built at Bath.

Mr Smith's friends immediately notified him by telephone and, although Mr McLeod got as far as Woodstock, he was ordered by telephone to return to Fredericton, and Mr Flemming was told not to come to the meeting. Mr Smith and his friend Squires were compelled to conduct the meeting single handed, but neither of them said a word about the bridge.

The trick is not very hard to understand. If either Mr Flemming or Mr McLeod, being members of the Government, had attended the meeting they would have been compelled to make a statement, and of course, being members of the Government, would be bound by it. Now that Mr Smith has abandoned his seat he is scarcely even a member of the Legislature, and therefore the Local Government is not in any way bound or influenced by anything he may say, and he is at liberty to make promises to the three places in question,—which he is doing, but nobody will be bound by anything he may say or do.

We are satisfied he will find it impossible to work his bridge game a second time.

Hartland the Scene of Big Liberal Rally.

Hartland, N. B., Sept 20.—The Liberal campaign in Carleton county, opened here Saturday evening with a large and attentive audience.

There were many Conservatives paying strict attention, and people present who came ten and fifteen miles. Frank Hagerman, as chairman, asked J C Everett, who last winter was strongly in favor of a change of local government, to make the opening address. He did so most effectively, declaring himself out and out in favor of the return of Mr Carvell.

Rev W B Morgan, a former Conservative, spoke briefly, after which Mr Carvell spoke for more than an hour and a half. He was before them he said, to discuss politics and nothing else, and he hoped that his course at Ottawa had been such as to induce the people to return him. He had accomplished something for his constituents, but not all he wanted to. He had other things in hand which would help his county if the government and he were returned. Four years ago he had promised to do all he could to bring the G.T.P. down the valley, had even secured a re survey and there his effort ceased

as the engineers decided against the valley route, while he had done all any man could do to the contrary.

He referred to the marvelous development of the country and particularly of the prosperity of Carleton county.

He dealt with the increased foreign trade, the reduction of taxation by way of decreased duties making it possible for the people to buy more and thus swelling the revenues of the country. The preferential tariff and immigration were discussed, and Mr Carvell explained what the North Atlantic Trading Company was.

He said that while the United States were still in the throes of a financial panic, his hearers knew that there was no panic in Canada and never had been.

Before closing he announced that before two years he should have a post office and public building not only for Hartland, but for Centreville as well. Cheers rang forth on this announcement being made, as the question is one the people are much interested in.

Hon W P Jones spoke briefly, as arriving late he did not desire to keep the people longer.

His discourse was largely against the local government. When Mr Jones said not only should B F Smith

resign, but every man of the local government as well, the audience cheered most heartily.

Mr Borden in Nova Scotia is telling the people that the expenditure is too high and calls attention to the expenditure in 1896 and today.
