

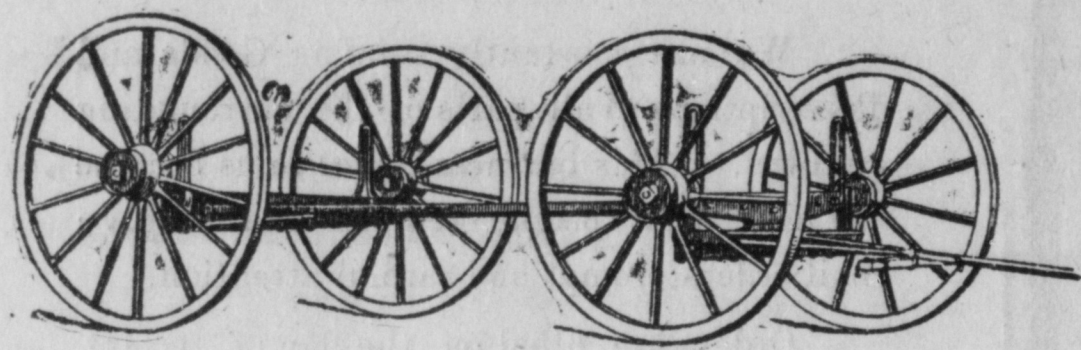

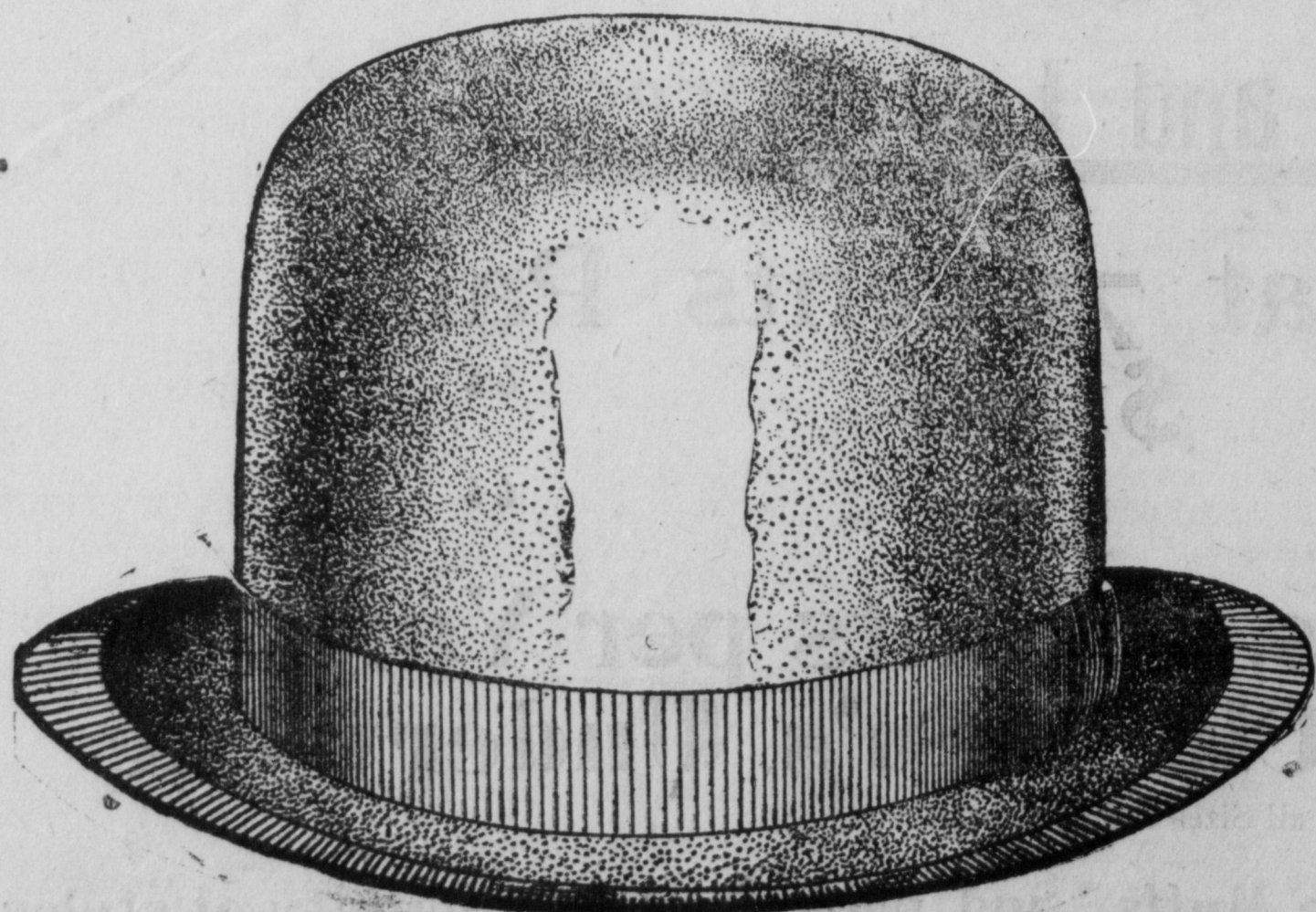

This Surely Can't Refer to B. Frank Smith

The Fredericton Herald a few days ago replying to an article in the Gleaner, contained the following editorial comment:

"The local graft organ refers to a respected member of the Liberal party who attended the committee meeting Friday evening as 'Corkscrew VanBaskirk.' The only man who seemed to be looking for a corkscrew that evening was a Tory M. P. P. from an up river county, who is seeking higher political honors, and judging from his appearance when he stumbled into the Liberal gathering, he had found what he wanted."

Can it be that our Benjamin Franklin Smith is the man referred to as the upriver M. P. P. seeking higher honors, and is it possible that he had sought, found and used, a corkscrew?

Perish the thought! There must be some fearful mistake in this. Mr Smith must have a double, one of those inconvenient things that so often get good people in trouble.

B. Frank Smith "stumbling" into a committee meeting! The first thing we know some horrible paper will be saying that Mr Smith was intoxicated. We have heard of persons both stumbling and jumbling in potato meetings, but we will give no names.

Presbyterian Censure of Tory Corruption.

The Toronto Presbyterian, which takes first rank among the religious journals of the Dominion and is recognized as a worthy mouthpiece of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, is not afraid, unlike certain of its contemporaries, to speak out boldly and plainly on the shocking revelations of bribery and corruption in the Stanfield election in Colchester. The Presbyterian in its issue of September 3rd, says, under the caption "For a Clean Election:"

"The country is upon the eve of a great political campaign. It is practically certain that within two months the general election for the Dominion Parliament will be held. Coincident with the announcement of the elections comes the report of an election trial in Nova Scotia with EVIDENCE OF POLITICAL CORRUPTION OF THE LOWEST AND MOST REVOLTING CHARACTER. The statement is made that the trial has been brought on at this time for the sake of its effect upon the approaching elections. However that may be, one would hardly expect that the effect, from the party standpoint, would be very great. Unfortunately, the practices disclosed have not been hitherto unknown in Canadian politics, nor have they been confined to one party. The evidence in Colchester could be matched by that taken in other courts and in other Provinces. Let us hope, however, that these saddening disclosures may have the effect of increasing the desire and the determination of those who care for their country's welfare that the coming election shall be conducted as far as possible in a clean and honorable manner. If politics were only a game, it should be played fairly and in accordance with the rules. But it is far more than a game. National and moral interests are involved. There is no party whose return to power is so essential, no issue at stake of such transcendent magnitude, that it is worth while for men to break the laws and debauch their fellows for the sake of gaining their desired end. Let good men unite for a clean election."

All honest men will endorse the Presbyterian's words. Let good men unite for a clean election and let them unite also to stamp out the hypocrisy and phariseism of those who are going up and down the country charging their opponents with all manner of offences, while arrogating to themselves all the virtues. Bribery and corruption are degrading, but, vile as they are, hypocrisy is still more demoralizing to the life of the country. Let us have done with humbug and cant, and face the issue as honest men are doing with honest men. Reform comes in no other way.

Liberals To Work.

The announcement of the dissolution of Parliament and of the date of the elections is the signal for the opening of the battle for which both parties have been preparing for many days. Polling will take place on Monday, October 26th, less than five weeks from today, so that the campaign will be short, as we believe it will be sharp, and the issue in favor of the Laurier Government decisive. Thrice within twelve years have the Liberals under the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier won notable successes at the polls, and we have the fullest confidence that the triumphs of 1896, and 1900, and 1904 will be repeated on this occasion. The Liberal Party goes into battle with a leader who stands in the forefront of the statesmen of Great Britain, and is accorded a premier place among the great men of the world; with a record of magnificent administrative successes sound finance and nation-building achievements; and with a truly national policy which appeals to the people of all classes and sections of the Dominion. Opposed to the Administration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is a party which is united upon nothing but a determination to slander its opponents and lie the Government out of office; without a policy and without leaders who inspire the confidence of the people. This, then, is the situation. The choice between the two leaders and the two parties—between a policy of constructive statesmanship and a policy of obstruction and detraction—is easy. The Canadian people would be recreant to their duty, if they failed to give the fullest measure of their confidence to a Government which has lifted Canada from the rock of stagnation and placed her in a proud position among the nations. Much has been done by the Laurier Government for the country's good but much remains to be done. Larger undertakings are under way and ought to be finished by friendly hands, and great projects are being planned for the development and upbuilding of our country. Canada needs Laurier at the helm, and if the memorable ovation in his honor in the heart of the enemy's country on Tuesday is any indication of the popular sentiment, as we believe it is, the people will rally to his standard and send Canada's great governing son back to finish the splendid programme which he has begun. The bugle call will find Liberals everywhere ready for the battle. They have a leader whose personality is the dominating feature of the campaign and they have that confidence in the righteousness of their cause which is born of victory. All that remains for them is to do their duty, promptly, fearlessly and honorably, and the triumph will be theirs.

Foster is Flooded.

"Now what has been the record of the Liberal Government, which has been accused by Mr Foster of extravagance? What has been the record? That record is that for the last twelve years, except one, we have had surpluses. We had not a surplus in the first year of our administration when we followed Mr Foster, we had a deficit of \$500,000, but the year after that, in 1897, we had a surplus of \$1,000,000, then \$4,000,000, then of \$9,000,000, then of \$5,000,000, then of \$7,000,000, then of \$14,000,000, then of \$15,000,000, and then of \$7,000,000 again, then of \$12,000,000, then of \$16,000,000 and at last \$19,000,000. The blossom is blighted, the leaf is withering, the God of Day goes down upon the dreary sea, and, in short, you are forever flooded, as I am.'
