## POLITICAL NOTES.

The Foresters Executive for New Brunswick claim the cause of the increase in rates is due to the inadequacy of the former assessment. Exactly that, but had the million dollars which George E Foster, Geo W Fowler et al made in speculation with the funds of the Order gone into the treasury of the society instead of the pockets of the manipulators the Order would have been just that much better off, and consequently the old rates would have been high enough for many years to come. This is simply a clear case of arithmetic and we challenge anyone to disprove our statement.

"No doubt," says the Manitoba Free Press, "the Liberals will bear with cheerfulness the sight of R. L. Borden swimming around the circle with his galaxy of Provincial Premiers—McBride, Roblin, Whitney, Hazen—in train; but they will mildly wonder why it is all right for provincial cabinet ministers to break into Dominion politics and all wrong for Dominion Cabinet Ministers to take an interest in the politics of their own province. It was an affront to decency, for instance, for Mr Pugsley to take a hand in the New Brunswick elections last March, while Mr Hazen's participation in the Dominion fight now is highly commendable."

Of course these are only minor details which Mr Smith through necessary to mention.

## The Exhibition.

The Exhibition was opened Tuesday afternoon in the presence of a fair crowd.

Mayor Balmain extended on behalf of the citizens a welcome to the visitors to the fair. He was particularly pleased at the exhibit made by the school children.

Mr Carvell expressed his pleasure at meeting such a large number as was present on the opening day. This was purely an agricultural exhibition, although manufacturers were also represented. He had travelled quite a lot throughout Canada, outside of the extreme west, and to his mind Carleton County was one of the finest spots in Canada. No place could be found where the people were more happy and contented. He had always felt that money spent on agriculture was well spent. The idea of holding fairs was that one neighbor could compare his stock and produce with others. He trusted that in the future such exhibitions would be held annually.

Mr Smith said it was gratifying to meet so many people as was present. One of the greatest difficulties was the lack of help for farm work. Only a few years ago we had to look to Uncle Sam for a market. Things have changed. Now we can sell our products to the mother country. Transportation is better now and we can find markets in Europe. He hoped the exhibition would be a great success from an agricultural and financial standpoint.

Hon Mr Flemming complimented the management on the successful opening. The exhibition of fruit was very creditable, the school exhibit was most pleasing and did much credit to the teachers and scholars. He was delighted that the rural schools sent in such good exhibits. He regretted that Governor Tweedie and the commissioner of agriculture were not present. Exhibitions encouraged the spirit of friendly rivalry. Farmers are anxious to do their best on such occasions when the eyes of the judges and spectators are on their products.

Mr Munro said he was interested in farming as he was one of a firm of manufacturers that supplied goods to farmers and if they were successful so would he be. He told of the visit of the Scotch farmers recently and how pleased they were with the farms in this country. He complimented the managers on the success of the fair and was pleased with the exhibit as a whole, but particularly well pleased with the school exhibit. The show is a fine one in every respect. The agricultural exhibits in particular are numerous and of a high class. The fancy work department is large and the exhibits many and excellent, showing a wonderful advance over previous exhibitions. There is a good poultry show. Wednesday was a big day, over 3000 in attendance. The horse races drew a good crowd. In the 2:35 race Ernest McLean's Steleta Glen won first money, Major Bill second, Dixie third. The green race was a very tight one between H D Birmingham's Alice D and Fred McLean's Sandy McDonald, victory going to the latter after five hotly contested heats, Manola third, Bowery Boy fourth.

The grand Marathon race from the track to Upper Woodstock and return had six starters, Warren K Flemming, Edward Ber y, Hugh Stairs, Perley Hartley, Chesley Stevens and Douglas Tompkins. They did the seven miles in just 49 minutes. All were bunched until within a quarter of a mile from the finish, when Flemming let out a bit and won handsily, with Berry and Stairs fighting hard for second honors.

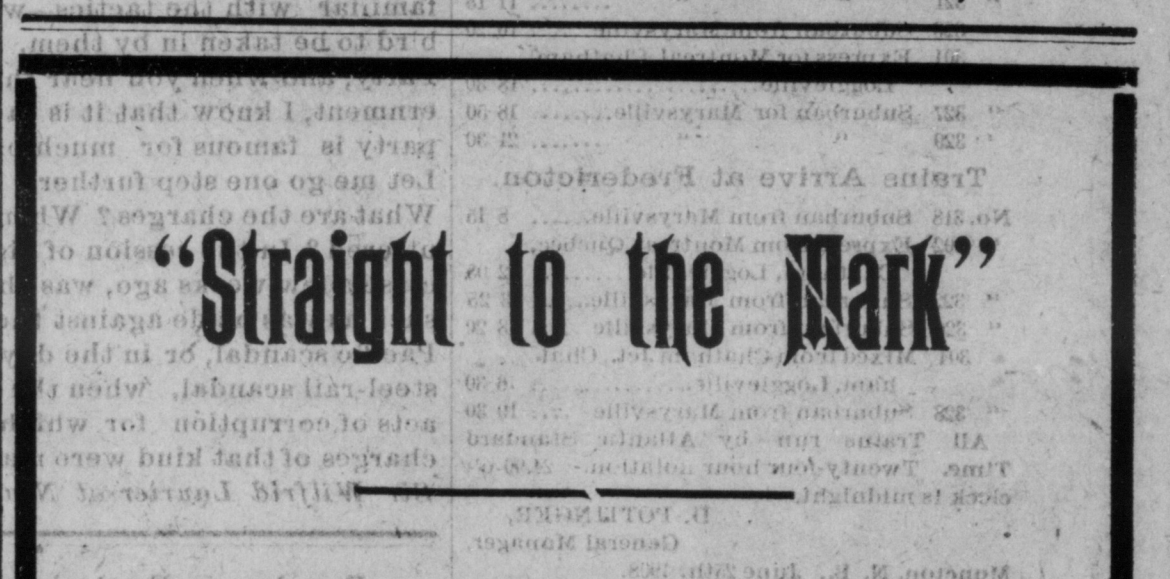
