The Hungry Must Be Fed.

A most determined effort is being made to decapitate practically every provincial Liberal officeholder in this County. The horde of hungry hangers on do not respect gray hairs, nor do they consider fitness for position. The offices particularly in demand are sheriff, deputy sheriff, registrar of deeds, police magistrate and probate registrar. There are several would-be sheriffs, but the knowing ones say Major Tompkins will have the position within a few weeks, and that Wm Kimball and James Woolverton, two life-long conservatives, are to divide the spoils of deputy. Friends of Ab Stewart and W W Melville dispute the right of Kimball and Woolverton to sip the sweets of office, so there is a merry struggle on. Frank Burpee's friends are likewise booming him. Over the position and its dependencies there is sure to be some disappointment. John S Leighton sr, registrar for over twenty years, is likewise being pursued, and may even now be marked for decapitation. He has some powerful backing in the Tory party, and despite the fact that either Coun John Flemming or Hon George W White might be prevailed upon to succeed him, will likely be retained. One of our present local members is said to have an eye on the job, but it is said is perfectly willing to wait until the eve of the next election, and would just as soon have Mr Leighton keep the seat warm for him as to have some younger man installed. Police Magistrate Dibblee's job is worth a few hundred dollars a year, and the friends of A A Holyoke are anxious to have him secure the position. For every job there is a score of waiting patriots, the hungry being in comparison like flies in summer. This may sound like lese majeste, but Governor Tweedie is not the man we take him for if after refusing to sanction recommendations by ex-Premier Robinson he should permit Premier Hazen to dismiss Liberals without even so much as an investigation under oath. The axe has already fallen in Gloucester. Where next?

There is an idea in the minds of certain parents that the College School is a veritable fire trap. Undoubtedly it is not a fireproof building, and what is worse, there seems little hope that in its place we shall have a modern structure within the next ten years. That being the case it is the duty of the authorities to render the school house as safe as possible. The town has a building inspector whose business it should be to look after just such cases, and order the proper persons to rectify all dangerous conditions. The School Trustees, however, are not asleep. They realize full well the necessity for certain changes at the College, and have plans under way for the carrying out of some improvements, including that of changing the doors of the main entrance so that they will swing outwards. The College has long outlived its utility as a school building. It is half a century behind the times, but we are seemingly forced by circumstances to retain it.
