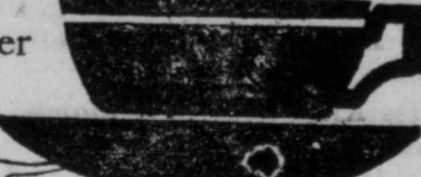

Mr. Maxwell, of St. John, who is a practical builder and who by experience is splendidly qualified for the post of commissioner of public works, is compelled to be content with an empty title, while another, who is an utter stranger to the work he is appointed to do, is chosen. The office of solicitor-general, which should have been abolished, is given to a lawyer with little legal and still less political experience, while Mr. Clarke, of Charlotte, one of the "old guard," who has a first class record as a lawyer and a politician, and who has besides given his party a splendid newspaper support, is turned down. What wonder that the new government should enter upon its duties with many heartburnings among its followers.
