The Toronto Globe's Tribute

While it would require many columns to contain all the complimentary things the newspapers of the Maritime provinces and Upper Canada have had to say concerning the present representative of this county, we believe none will be more appreciated than the editorial tribute in that greatest of all Canadian papers, The Toronto Globe, which on Monday of this week said:—

Mr Carvell has been unanimously re-nominated for Carleton County, New Brunswick. Mr Carvell during the short time he has been in Parliament has taken a high position as a powerful and vigorous debater. He asks odds from no man. He has incurred the hostility of the Tory press by the skill and ability with which he has helped to smother some of the alleged scandals, which generally lasted no longer than until the other side was heard. Then they died.

Mr Carvell's friends and supporters in the constituency will feel very much gratified at the estimate placed upon our representative's worth by the dean of Canadian newspaperdom.

The Final Result.

The final result in Saskatchewan is 26 Liberals to 14 Conservatives, with one election yet to be held. This proves one thing beyond reasonable doubt: the west is still solid for the Liberal party, and Laurier will receive another lease of power. Tory hope of victory must now be abandoned.
