July 9th, 1894.

He will no doubt read the full correspondence between himself and Hon Wm Pugsley, in the course of which he became supremely ridiculous, according to one of his own colleagues, Geo J. Clarke M. P. P. for Charlotte. Mr Smith will no doubt give his reasons for not opposing the Hazen \$2 highway act, and explain his patent adjustable bridge policy. Mr Munro will probably apologize for Mr Hazen's course in continuing this old government practice of charging commissions for the settlement of succession duties, and as a curtain-raiser might very well explain the agricultural policy of the new government. NORTH BAY, Ont., Aug 13.—While two excursion trains carrying harvesters from the Maritime Provinces to the west were stalled at Chalk River today by a small freight wreck, excursionists amused themselves by attacking and looting a village hotel. The proprietor was carried out of the building and over a thousand dollars' worth of liquors and cigars carried off. The mad excursionists even invaded the cellar and carried a car load of beer in kegs to the trains, where they emptied the water tanks in the cars filling them up with ale.

Fighting became general and one man had his nose split open and sustained other injuries. At MacKies Station the station house was attacked during the stop and the agent's furniture wrecked. At North Bay there was little trouble, as the first sign of hooliganism was met with the arrest of seven of the excursionists.

The last great "scandal" upon which the Conservatives built their highest hopes was the charge made by Major Hodgins against the National Transcontinental Commission to the effect that the country was being robbed of about \$4,000,000 by fraudulent over-classification of the value of the work done by contractors in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Investigation into this matter was demanded by the commissioners themselves and ended not only in a complete disproof of the charges but in their full withdrawal by the accuser himself, who was compelled to admit that his suspicion was founded on technical difference of opinion between engineers which were already under investigation by a technical tribunal appointed for the purpose. In one specific instance where he had charged that somewhere in the vicinity of 80c. per cubic yard was being paid for excavation which was worth at the most 40c., it was proven that the actual price paid by the commissioners was only 29c.
