We Need a Dairy Supt.

The local government, in its zeal for the appointment of commissions, seems to have overlooked the dairy superintendent question. The county of Carleton is, or could be, a great producer of butter and cheese. York, Victoria and Madawaska are in the same class. What we need is a competent superintendent. By that we mean an official who knows the butter and cheese business from beginning to end, one who is able when visiting a factory to point out any defects in the products and suggest adequate remedies, as well as having sufficient ability to defend his actions either on the platform or through the papers. He should, moreover, be capable of keeping in touch with the best outside markets, thereby being able to point out the most satisfactory places for the disposal of our dairy products. Such a man as we have outlined would be a great acquisition. Where are our three local members? Are they anxious to see the government which they support continue so brazenly indifferent to our greatest industry?

Foster Gets the Palm.

Of a total of some 8,700 Hansard columns for the session the Opposition members poured forth over 4,640 and the Government members only a little over 4000, although they are nearly twice as numerous as the Opposition members. Mr Foster with 824 columns tops the list, being about 50 per cent more eloquent than his nominal leader Mr Borden. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was able to get in only about one word to Mr Foster's three.

Dr Roche of Marquette is credited with the longest speech of the session, his deliverance on the Election Bill occupying 63 columns and costing for printing which the country foots over \$3,000.

In Saskatchewan.

A despatch from Regina, announcing the dissolution of the legislature, with election on August 14th. This will be a short and snappy contest, the parties in the late house being quite evenly divided. A redistribution took place last session, several new constituencies coming into existence. Premier Scott will lead the Liberal forces, and Hon F W G Haultain is in the front of the attack. No doubt Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr Borden will eagerly await the result, as it will be something of a forecast on what may be expected in the West when the federal contest occurs.

The School Building.

At a meeting of the School Board Tuesday afternoon Harry H Mott of St John was given the contract to draw up plans and specifications for a new school house at Broadway. We understand the proposed structure is to be of brick, thoroughly modern, and large enough to accommodate eight departments. The heating is to be by steam. No doubt the whole town, and particularly Wellington Ward, will be proud of the building, which is to be ready for use a year from now. The cost is estimated at something like \$20,000. Mr Mott has undertaken to have his plans ready in a week. About a fortnight will be given for tenders, and it is hoped that the successful contractor may be at work by the last week in August. The roof must be on before winter.
