DEAR SIR,—Yours of the 23rd inst, to hand and in reply would say that the 18.22 per cent means that the ore runs 18.22 per cent in Copper. On a basis of one ton of ore this will give 361 pounds of Copper per ton, which taken at an average value of 13c per pound would give \$47.33 as the value of the ore per ton.

In so far as we can judge from the sample submitted, and provided same is a fair sample of the deposit, it would merit your looking into same very carefully and we would advise that you have the advice of a mining engineer in the matter.

The selection of ore which gave the above assay was taken from the drift in the vein 50ft north of where the tunnel tapped it and at a depth of about 40 ft. The vein is over 9 ft wide from foot wall to hanging wall. The company have 80 ft of tunnel and a little over 50 ft of drift completed. The value of ore is increasing as they work their way up the vein and has every evidence of an excellent prospect. The directors are very much elated over their success so far, and feel confident that they will strike it rich before they complete the next 100 feet, which will bring them under the open cut where they have proven the vein to be 18 ft wide on the surface and bearing ore which assays as high as 20 per cent in copper and carries good value in gold and silver.

J C Hovey the managing director, has taken a contract for 50 ft more of tunnel and is pushing the work.

It is expected that a great deal of prospecting on the surrounding claims will be carried on during the summer. Sixteen prospecting claims of five square miles each, were staked out in this country last fall, and the prospects are that the coming season will be a busy one in the mining line.

A Matter of Economy.

If the thousand and one things about the house that make money go fast—the little things that don't seem to count—were bunched together in one, it would not be so difficult to stop the leak.
